#### A match to remember Fives Discover the Joy of Six

In the last match of the Famous Fives inaugural season in 2016, they faced Marchmont 3s on the diminutive pitch at Cavalry Park 3. Wins had been hard to come by in the Fives' first season.

Some good bowling by the juniors -Rua (5.2-1-18-3), Euan (6-0-31-2) and Ethan (8-3-13-3) gave the Fives a target of 192.

After 32 overs, Carlton were on 151-7 when things got a bit heated. The Marchmont skipper objected to a bowler being called for bowling bouncers that flew several feet over Jamie Beattie's head.

He was further incensed when Alan Murray was adjudged not out off a bump ball (a near relation umpiring). Play continued under a different umpire and the Captain's report takes over the story:

"With 8 overs left 39 runs were still needed with Alan and Jamie in the middle. Scampered singles and the occasional boundary gradually reduced the runs required without further loss of wickets and we went into the last over.

'We needed 8 for victory. Cooper's previous 5 overs had gone for 12 runs, one of our batters was 10 years old and so the odds were stacked in Marchmont's favour. 'First ball, swish and a miss from Alan, second ball a single to mid-on, third ball swish and a miss from Jamie (seven needed off three).... Jamie calmly pushed to cover for a single off the fourth ball (six off two)....Alan's clump to cow off the penultimate ball brought two more scampered runs and Carlton needed a boundary off the last ball. Cooper bowled a length ball, and Alan who in a moment of proper cricket swung straight down the line and launched the ball directly back over the bowler ....the long-on fielder raised both hands high above his head to signal the maximum and Carlton had won by 3 wickets.'

An outstanding game and a fantastic team performance to conclude the first season of Fifth XI cricket in Carlton's' history.

The Fives' first season was tough. But see how the juniors introduced to senior cricket that year have progressed - it is clear it was worth it.
