# **SUPER ALI!**

Fraser Watts pays tribute to Ali Evans who stands down as Captain after 5 highly successful years:

'Ali has done an incredible job since taking the helm. An inspirational leader who is respected by all at Carlton and who has taken the club to new heights. He has always led from the front and raised the standards of those around him. No better example of this was the 2017 Scottish Cup quarter-final when he bowled us to victory against Poloc, and then in the final against Watsonians when he dragged us out of the mire. It is fitting that he is the first Carlton captain to lift the Scottish Cup. Congratulations to Evo for a fine stint at the helm and thank you from everyone at the club.'

Ali skippered the First XI 78 times in all formats, winning 72% of these matches among the highest success ratios in the club's history. In 2017, his first season as captain, he was the first Carlton skipper to hold aloft the Scottish Cup and in 2021 he led the side to victory in the National T20 Cup.

Only Alun Davies (201) and Cedric English (117) have lead the club on more occasions in the modern era (iepost 1950). (It is an open guess how many matches NL Stevenson skippered during his 28 years of captaincy between 1902 and 1948).

Well done Evo - congratulations on a great reign.

### Live from Grange Loan!



#### Carlton fans enjoyed last season's Live Streams of the victories in the Men's T20 and the Women's Cup. The good news is that more is coming!

Carlton is delighted to announce that matches at Grange Loan will be streamed through the <u>FrogBox LiveStream system</u>. This exciting development, encouraged by CricketScotland, will give Carlton supporters far and wide the opportunity to watch Carlton matches.

The live streaming will be via a camera situated at the top of the ground and is powered by the electronic scoring app. There are enhanced functions available for graphics and capturing of highlights which we hope to develop the use of in due course.

The broadcast will be via YouTube, so has the potential to reach large numbers of cricket supporters, which will open up greater sponsorship opportunities on club clothing, advertising boards at the ground inline with the camera position and potentially on the live screen itself.

Recent news of the <u>discovery of the</u> <u>wreck of Sir Ernest Shackleton's</u> <u>ill-fated ship</u> in the Weddell Sea, where it sank crushed by ice in 1915, reminded many of Carlton's link with that voyage.

Robert Clark, 'a beautiful bat, using his wrists to full advantage in making a panoply of classic strokes' played for the club between 1911 and 25 an winning 4 Scottish caps.

Clark served as biologist to Shackleton's expedition, and was among those left on Elephant Island to await rescue as Shackleton and others set off in an open boat to cross the Southern Ocean to South Georgia, about 800 miles away.

# **Paul Smith**

<u>Newsletter 10</u> told the tragic story of Alan L Smith, who in 1933, visited Grange Loan as the skipper of Stocksfield CC. Alan collapsed and died as the match reached its conclusion. Contemporary newspaper reports suggest that the intense heat at Grange Loan that day may have contributed to the tragedy.

Alan's grandson Paul Smith played 221 First Class matched for Warwickshire between 1982 and 1996 - a period of spectacular success in the county's history. He scored over 8000 runs and took nearly 300 wickets.

Paul was a recent guest at the Cricket Society of Scotland where he spoke about his career - among those he played alongside at Edgbaston were Bob Willis, Alan Donald,Brian Lara, Dermot Reeve and Gladstone Small, all under the masterful coaching of Bob Woolmer.

After his professional career Paul moved to the US for some years where he played a big part in an <u>initiative to use cricket to</u> <u>counter the gang culture in Los Angeles.</u>

Paul asked whether he could visit the ground where his grandfather died. Hugh Parker and Andy MacPherson were only too happy to oblige.

### **ALL ROUNDER** Searching for the best all-rounder in Carlton's history.

This handsome trophy, which resides in the Grange Loan Trophy Cabinet is engraved:

Presented by the Carlton Cricket Club to **C. S. Paterson** in appreciation of his record in season 1921 1000 runs & 100 wickets

It is impossible to imagine Charles Strathearn Paterson's 1921 season being repeated in modern times. Players play fewer matches (Paterson had 27 innings in 1921) and in different formats from those in the past. So was Paterson Carlton's best ever all rounder?


Paterson was a long time Carlton servant first appearing in 1904 (when he would have been 21). He captained the club in 1927, the year he won the last of his 11 Scottish caps when he led the side to victory in Ireland.

NL Stevenson describes him as follows: 'Paterson will be best remembered as a sound opening bat and for his splendid medium-paced bowling, particularly from 1920 onwards. In not a few of our matches he was 'unplayable'. Paterson's batting was always safe and correct, and he was one of those players who, once they are set never look like getting out.'

Paterson scored only 2 centuries for Carlton with a top score of 138\* in 1921. He got another 100 wicket haul in 1923, his best bowling analysis was 6-2 in 1926 (a year in which he was best bowler). He was best bowler and batter in 1913 and best batter in 2 other seasons.

Edinburgh-born he pursued a career in insurance and died in 1973.





Even though it was deemed at the time exceptional enough to be marked by the award of a trophy, Paterson's double was not unique. It had been matched on two previous occasions in the club's history by G. W. Jupp, in 1908 and 1910. George actually headed Jupp the batting averages in Paterson's golden year of 1921.

G. W. Jupp, was born in Somerset but came to Edinburgh in 1894 as a civil servant. Later he was to play for Somerset on a number of occasions. He was Carlton's best batter in 11 seasons, and best bowler in 3, winning both in 1910 (711 runs; 67 wkts). In 1900 he scored over 1500 runs for the club. In all, Jupp scored 21 centuries for Carlton, with a top score of 202\* in 1908 (both still club records). represented He Scotland on 11 occasions including 3 appearances against the Australians. He died in Longniddry in 1938. An obituary in the Scotsman describes him as one of the most popular cricketers who ever played in Scotland.

Jupp's career overlapped not only with Paterson's, but with another contender for Carlton's best ever all-rounder - T. R. (Tom) Crosskey. Like Jupp he was born south of the border, in Sussex, and came to Carlton as professional in 1930. He was the club's best batter in 7 of the 8 years he was professional. He returned after WW2 as an amateur (changing his appearance in scorecards and press reports from Crosskey to T. R. Crosskey), during which he won the best bat award on a further 5 seasons and was also best bowler in 3 of those seasons (itself a club record).

Crosskey was an all-rounder in another sense he was also professional а playing in goal for Hearts footballer among others. In that capacity he organised a charity match between Carlton and Hearts in 1936. A second fixture was played 81 years later in 2017.

FEATS IN SCOTTISH CRICKET CROSSKEY THREE SHORT OF CENTURY

CARLTON'S WIN OVER GRANGE

The first post-war encounter betwee Carlton and Grange at Grange Loan will be remembered as "Crosskey's match." The Carlton prefessional, who was taking his benefit, celebrated the occasion in fitting manner by accomplishing his finest all-round performance of the season, and ensuring an easy win for his club over their old-time rivale.

rivals. Spectators and players alike were sadly disappointed when Crosskey failed to reach the covered century by such a narrow margin a 3 runa. After defyinit the Grange bowlers for 160 minutes, he looked capable of staying ail day, but in trying to force the pace, as the time for applying the closure to the Carlton innings was approaching, he got himself run out. It was an unfortunate ending to a charac-teristic Crossicor innings, which was notable for sound defence and skilful placing rather than hard hitting. He reached the boundary only five times, T. S. Purves, more restrained than usual, and R. H. Tattersall, who hesited on enterprising lines, gave the professional some very useful support. Crosskey played for Scotland on 7 occasions including in 1948 against Australia in Aberdeen - Bradman's last international appearance.

Unfortunately Crosskey's off field behaviour did not match his on field quality and he left Carlton in 1950 under a very dark cloud. He continued to play in Northumberland until 1957 and died in 1971 in Devon.

life after his years behind the stumps at Carlton



I found myself standing at the pavilion end, looking down the infamous Carlton as we were being corralled by Cheeky into something that football resembled а formation. Murrav Whitaker was there. "Shouldn't he be trying to steal an extra biscuit from one of Stevie Gilmour's summer camps?" I asked myself. It was then that it struck me - I looked from side-to-side my teammates for at the morning's warm up. Arun. Ali Evans. I was even in the same team as Omar. Realisation dawned. I was playing for the oldies side.

Ask any retired cricketer and they'll be able to tell you of the exact moment they realised it was time to call it a day. For me, having to endure Omar's obstinate refusal to pass the ball in the warm-up was the straw that broke the camel's back. I hung the gloves up, set fire to my inners out of respect for those that would use the changing room after me and, in true Carlton fashion, left my kit in the sibcas to be ransacked by the juniors and Rory McCann. I swapped Stoneywood Dyce Away for an ascent of Buachaille Etive Mor, and I've looked back since. As I spent an not increasing amount of time in the mountains of Scotland and became bored with just walking up them, I decided that taking up rock climbing would be a good idea. Despite what my mother thinks, it's still not as dangerous as standing up to Cedric English on a green one.

For the first time ever, my calendar was full of free weekends and I made the most of them by searching for adventure in the Scottish mountains or further afield.

As those who have watched me bat will attest, I have a short attention span. Consequently, after teaching PE for eight years, I decided to swap Boroughmuir for Borneo and my wife and I accepted teaching positions at Jerudong International School in Brunei. Most people have only heard of Brunei as the answer to a Fantasy Bob guiz question but it's one of the few places in the world that has relatively untouched primary rainforest. We flew straight into a lockdown here, after boasting to anyone who would listen that Brunei had been covid-free for the last twelve months, but restrictions are now easing and we've spent a lot of time in the jungle looking for waterfalls and wildlife. The monsoon period is also close to ending which heralds the start of the scuba diving season. Despite being kicked out of the ICC, cricket in Brunei is very popular amongst the expat population with a thirty-over league running regularly. I'll have to get over my disdain for artificial decks but I fully intend to get the reverse sweep out of the locker when the opportunity arises!

Wherever I am in the world, I'll never be too far away from Carlton. I still follow all of the matches and enjoy seeing photos of McCann and Arun using my bats, Tom using my keeping gloves and, judging from the smile on his face, Cheeky wearing my box. I'm very fortunate to have left Carlton with amazing memories of sporting success but it's the people of Carlton that stick with me the most; Andy Macpherson's words of wisdom, Alasdair's gruff yet affectionate welcome as I walked through the gate and the disappointment of my father as I ran myself out. Again. I hope there are lots of juniors out there who will go on to enjoy their time at the club as much as I did. And hopefully with a better average at the end of
