The Junior Season in Numbers

Anyone who spends any time around Carlton CC will know that our junior players play a lot of cricket.

Martin Firth has pulled some stats from Pitchero which show the breadth and variety of cricket played this summer.

Fixtures

Junior teams played 127 matches this season, which is particularly remarkable when we bear in mind that junior hardball leagues take a break in July.

The Primary School, Stars, Swifts, Caimans and Under 16 teams all played 10, but the Kwik cricketers, Strikers and Girls Hardball, all managed 11 each.

Players

In all, 179 players represented Carlton in at least one match - 92% of the junior membership - a great achievement. 82 players played in at least one KwikCricket fixture.

We have some extremely enthusiastic players. Five players played more than 20 games for Carlton junior teams this season: Aadi Khadse, Aaradhy Khadse, James Stronach, Tom Hathorn - but the most-selected junior player this summer is Tom Sweet, with 28 games to his name.

We actively encourage our older juniors to play senior cricket too, and they respond with the same amount of enthusiasm as for junior cricket. Aadi Khadse (22) & James Stronach (21) both played more than 20 senior games, with Robbie Murray, Kieran Glass, Benjamin Risi & Hamish Foley not far behind.

Families

Carlton is, above all, a family club. Luckily for us, cricket is a game ideally suited to juniors and parents playing together. We haven't yet seen 3 generations of a family turn out in the same game, but it must surely only be a matter of time.

45 games this season featured more than one member of at least one family. The Fifth XI led the way, featuring three family pairs on 10 occasions - 1/3 of their total games. The Mixed Dev Team managed it on 4 occasions - about 1/4 of their games, but one of those games included four family pairs! But they were both trounced by the Kwik cricketers, who fielded 5 families on two separate occasions.

31 families played together on at least one occasion. Almost all of those were 2 members of the family in the same game, but one family managed to have three members in the same game: all three cricket-playing Charmans featured in the Fifth team game against the Eccentric Flamingos. The Players v Parents match featured 4 Stronachs - 2 per side.

The families who led the way with most appearances by family members in the same game are perhaps unsurprising: the Foleys lead the way with 18, closely followed by the Stronachs & (Keith) Murrays on 17, and the Khadses on 16.

JUNIOR CRICKET AT CARLTON - A LONG TRADITION

We tend to think of junior cricket at Carlton as a relatively recent phenomenon, started in the 1980s under Peter Nettleton and nurtured successively by Gavin Scott, John Boyd and Kerry Simpson.

However there is a longer history. In *Play*, the history of Carlton, NL Stevenson writing about the 1934 season notes, 'The revival of the Carlton Juniors who had been defunct since the Club moved to Grange Loan in 1905, proved a great success and it was surely a good augury for the club to see the names of Currie, Phillips and Heath figure prominently in their team.'


These are references to the sons of prominent Carlton figures - two of whom can be seen in the First XI photo below. James Currie was no longer playing by then but did much work on the upkeep of Grange Loan and became Club President in 1945. Dr JE Phillips was born in Barbados and came to Edinburgh to study medicine. He first played for Carlton in 1913. He was club captain in 1928 and best bat in 1936. He was renowned as a big hitter - and is reported to have hit the ball into the railway at Myreside.

Phillips played a handful of matches for Scotland - as Stevenson describes his international career - 'He played for Scotland against Ireland and against Middlesex hitting a characteristic 6 off JT Middlesex and England Hearne the This audacious effort did not bowler. apparently appeal to the Scottish Cricket Union selectors for Phillips was chosen only once more for a a representative match, although for season after season he was among the best two or three aggressive batsmen in Scotland.'

Phillips enjoyed a long career - he was Vice Captain in 1948 (Stevenson's own last year as skipper) and skipper again in 1951 and 52.

The Rev HFT Heath was Carlton's best bat and bowler in 1927, best bowler in 1928 and 1934, captain in 1929. He was an Australian, and had played First Class cricket for South Australia. He came to Scotland after the First World War, eventually becoming a Minister in the United Free Church in Edinburgh. He preached at Chalmers Church in the West Port (now demolished and replaced by a University building).

NL Stevenson had 7 children! Six girls and one boy, Douglas. He does not record whether Douglas was a Carlton Junior - but it seems highly likely: he is

mentioned as playing with his father in a match against St Boswells in 1929 when he 'was still a school boy'. Batting at 11, his services were not required as his Dad saw the team home by 2 wickets. Douglas qualified in medicine and matured into some sort of cricketer and is featured in the First XI photograph for 1934. In 1939 Stevenson senior records that against Edinburgh University, he and his put on 37 for the ninth wicket.

There is no further reference in *Play* to Currie, Heath or Phillips Jnr - nor indeed to Junior Cricket at Carlton. Sadly all records are lost in the mists of time.

Congratulations to Fergus Foley whose brilliant innings of 84* at Grange Loan won him the Outstanding Performance by a Junior in Senior Cricket Award.

What do you remember about your innings? When I went in I started batting with Keith who was already 'in' and batting well. Martin R fell quickly and then I had to set up a partnership with Robbie, and then Ollie. I've batted a lot with Ollie, so we settled in nicely and kept things going. We knew we needed to settle in, consolidate and then accelerate to keep up with the run rate. It was a big target but we ran really well between the wickets and managed to get there - which was great. Also it was one of the first times my grandad who lives down in England was watching me play, AND it was his birthday, so he was really pleased.

Is this your biggest score ever?

For Seniors at Carlton - yes. But this season at school my top score was 115 - which was great!

Besides this match, what were your favourite matches for senior teams this year?

I really liked playing for the 3s. I didn't bat well on that occasion, but I did get three wickets!

What were your best/favourite matches) for junior teams? (This or any other season)?

I really enjoyed reaching the Northern Finals last year in the U13 ECB cup at Neston - but my favourite match was against Chester-le-Street which we won at home to reach the finals.

What do you think are the differences between playing junior and senior cricket?

I just enjoy the step up playing for seniors.



You also played for Eastern Knights this year - what was memorable about those games?

EK won the whole series this year which was the first time in a couple of years. I was Skipper for the EK U15s and that was great, especially when playing with so many other Carlton players (I think there were 7 in a squad of 18 - (photo below) and we've all played together for years since KWIK Cricket!!!

Favourite food?

Steak

Favourite school subject? Geography Favourite TV show? Any sport. Favourite music?

Bit of everything - depends!

Who are your favourite International players (and why)?

Stokes - he lives life on the edge. Bats and bowls on the front foot and is always positive. And he's an all rounder!





BEN STRONACH MAURICE MURPHY AWARD FOR OUTSTANDING POTENTIAL*

Ben was a key member of the Scotland u15 set up this year and made his debut for Carlton 2nd XI.

Which Scotland matches did you play and where?

What are your most memorable moments from them?

Taking a catch on the boundary to win the first game of the Celtic Cup.

Also bowling king a double wicket maiden in the first over of a T20 match against Ireland.

How did the team celebrate winning the Celtic Cup?

There was no real celebration, just all very happy.

Was playing for Scotland or Carlton 2nd XI difficult? What were the differences?

The Scotland games felt more difficult as a bowler because the opening batsmen were always very good and if I didn't take a wicket in my first three to four overs I would be taken off. If I came back on in the middle/end overs, the batsmen were still good.

Outside the internationals what have been your favourite games this year?

My favorite game was when Max D'Ulisse and I took four wickets each in the 2's to beat Heriot's in a close game. I also hit 50* against Grange in the Scottish Cup.

Who are your favourite a) Carlton b) international players?

My favourite Carlton players are Ali Shah (because of his sixes) and Arun Pillai.

My favourite international players are Mitchell Starc and the now retired Mitchell Johnson.

What is your favourite food? Nandos.

What is your favourite subject at school?

Games (rugby).

What is your favourite computer game?

*The Maurice Murphy Award was inaugurated in 2019. Maurice served for many years as the club's auditor and at the time of the first award he was the club's oldest living member. Sadly he died in 2020. Previous winners are Zaara Dancu and Max D'Ulisse. Carlton Junior Tomos Hunt began his umpiring career this season and officiated at a number of ESCA Championship and Masterton matches. He is the first junior cricketer to do so.

It was a busy summer for Tomos. He also played junior cricket and turned out several times for the Mixed Development XI.

What got you interested in becoming an umpire? I had been interested in officiating sports for a while and tried to do football refereeing, but I was too young so thought I would give umpiring a try and it turned out to be a great idea.

What was the training programme? There were 2 Zoom courses each about 7 hours long. It was mostly a presentation about the laws and how to enforce them. Afterwards we got given a link to become a member and sign up for WhosTheUmpire, the platform used to assign fixtures and resources. There was no test or anything like that - the closest you will come to that is a colleague assessment which is just another umpire giving you advice (in a more formal format) on what you could do better. It's been really helpful.

What was the best piece of advice you have received from other umpires (or players)? Take your time and be confident. Even if you get it wrong the players will be ok with your decision as they have confidence in you and your decision making.

How did you feel before your first match as umpire? I was nervous and felt a bit underprepared, but it ended up going well. Sadly, it got rained off after about 30 overs, but it was a great first game with some challenging decisions.



Are there any decisions that you found particularly difficult? Caught behind with the keeper standing up is always quite tough as there is less time to see any deviation off the bat. The sound of a keeper's gloves and an edge can be similar and happen very quickly.

What do you see as your future as an umpire? I want to take it as far as I can and enjoy it as much as I can.

What would you say to anyone else who might be thinking of becoming an umpire? Go for it, it's great fun and if you find you don't enjoy it then you don't have to keep doing it. CSMOA* is amazing at helping new umpires start out and they pair with vou more experienced umpires when you start to ease the pressure on you.

FESTIVAL TIME

Euan Sweet reviews the summer's Kwik Cricket action.

One of the most enduring scenes of the summer is a Sunday morning's sun-drenched Grange Loan covered in a swarm of Kwik cricketers. 2022 saw more than 80 Kwik Cricketers represent the club as we welcomed the return of the 'travelling circus' of Kwik Cricket festivals.

Our season began with 2 intra-club Sunday mornings which gave some of our youngest players their first taste of competitive cricket, guided kindly and sportingly by those with more experience. At the first festival of the year, hosted by Watsonians, Carlton fielded 4 teams, giving 32 players the chance to represent their club. They did the club proud with their enthusiasm, teamwork and sporting attitude, as they continued to do all year.

Then we sent a team to Penicuik, to help them mark their juniors' 10th anniversary, and, with a break in the festival schedule, Carlton opened our gates to embrace the enthusiasm being observed at the festivals by holding some impromptu events. We hosted 6 clubs and, at one point had 5 games of cricket going on simultaneously all over the outfield at GL.

Carlton's own festival, in late July, provided the opportunity for the great Martin Firth to dust off his SIBCAS keys and re-enter the Kwik Cricket organisation arena. The day was a great success, and we are extremely grateful to all those volunteers who provided a wonderful welcome to our visiting players and supporters.(See Martin's Report in NL 47)

After taking 2 teams to Linlithgow, we took another two to Gala to play in the annual Rowan Boland cricket tournament. This tournament is held in memory of Rowan Boland, an enthusiastic young cricketer who tragically died aged nine. Both teams performed admirably and only lost out to 2 impressive Gala sides who went on to play each other in the final. The photo below captures some of the action.

This year's Kwik Cricket, at Carlton, can be summed up in one word – participation. Huge numbers of players representing their club in a huge number of matches.

Many thanks to all the players and parents for creating such a successful season. Many thanks, also, to all those parents who stepped in to help run the teams and the games. And thank you to the ground-staff and others at the club who helped organise and set up so many opportunities for our young cricketers.





Players v Parents

There was a record number of Stronachs on the pitch in the end of season match - Keith Murray describes the action.

The inaugural (maybe - see next page) Players v Parents hardball match took place on Saturday 10 September at Grange Loan. There were two not entirely evenly matched teams of 12 a side; one of athletic up and coming juniors, and the other of gnarled veterans of mixed ability, helpfully supplemented by Joe Ward playing his final, final match for Carlton.

Both teams wore black armbands and observed a Minute's Silence at the start of the match in honour of the late Queen Elizabeth II.

I had noted that the Players' team had significantly more players who had played at a higher level this season and suggested to the Players' captain Ben Stronach that it might be a good idea if the Players batted first, in case the Parents collapsed. When Ben duly won the toss, he took the hint and sensibly opted to bat.

However, the Parents were quickly in amongst the wickets and had the youngsters in some trouble at 39 for 4 after 10 overs. The situation was then rectified by a solid innings from Ben, initially retiring on 30*, ably supported by Dougie (32) and Robbie (33*). Oli added a brisk 23 and Ben returned to finish with an excellent 50*.

With one ball left, the Players ostentatiously declared on 212 for 8 off 39.5 overs. Almost all of the Parents bowled at least one over, with varying degrees of success, and wickets were shared around, but fittingly the best figures were Joe's 2 for 30.

The Parents' reply qot off to an inauspicious start when Robbie removed me early on, but solid innings from Iain Hathorn (32), Edward Stronach (33*), Jon Foley (32) and Euan Murray (26) got the Parents close to the target. The Players rather sportingly insisted on posting two or even three slips up until the final few overs and this may have assisted the Parents somewhat.
