On Sunday 14 July, **Alison Amin** reports, Carlton was asked to get a couple of girls down to Grange Loan to be interviewed by the BBC for a piece on girls' cricket to be broadcast live from Lord's as part of Woman's Hour on Radio 4, on 17 July. Eight excited participants turned up and took part. Keira, Elsie, Lindsay and Abby were lucky enough to make the director's cut! They were a credit to themselves and to Carlton.

The U15 girls team are having a great season. So far they have played five games, won 2 and lost 3 (all close losses apart from last week against MDAFS, however our team was a bit short due to holidays!).

They have played against Lomond Lynx, Stew Mel, RHC, Watsonians, and MDAFS. Before the end of August will meet Stew Mel and Watsonians again, and Westquarter & Redding.

The girls are a lovely bunch, ranging in age from P7 to S4, with the majority around the age of 12/13yrs. They love playing together developed and have close bonds and friendships through playing together. They are learning all the time and some are regularly selected to play in the Women's 2nd team; a few have been selected for WPL games, which is a great opportunity for the youngsters. Sam Haggo and Sarah Beith are very encouraging and supportive of the girls.

While the Girls' Hardball Squad in its present form is a relatively recent development, Carlton has a long history of promoting girls' cricket. As was described in <u>Newsletter Issue</u> <u>25</u>, a debt is owed to John Boyd and Eric Edwards in initiating girls' coaching sessions at Grange Loan over 10 years ago.



Girl Power!

The development of Carlton's female side

When John Boyd took over as Carlton's Junior Convener in 2007, co-ed primary school coaching on a Wednesday was working well but there was a sharp drop off in girls' participation beyond age 10. Maybe it was just that as boys become stronger and sweatier the girls seemed more selective about who they wanted to spend their Wednesday evenings with. Eric Edwards' daughter Louise was interested in cricket but her words may have summed things up, 'Boys are, like, so uncool.' How could these girls be catered for?

Having chewed things over with Eric, John asked him if he'd be interested in running group coaching specifically for girls on Wednesday evenings. Eric signed up there and then. Leigh Kasperek also volunteered to coach the group - and what better inspiration could the girls have?

After a couple of years, when the older girls were in S2, Eric started a girls' hard ball group who made Grange Loan their own on Friday evenings. The girls played their first hard ball fixture on 4 May 2012, triumphing against Kinross - see picture below.



The challenge then became how to transition the older girls into senior cricket. A few mums had expressed an interest in getting involved, but there was no obvious path to pull together the numbers to start a women's team.

At that point Kari Carswell and Gordon Drummond put John in contact with Helen Blair and Llly Cartwright from Edinburgh University. They and some friends were keen to play cricket in Edinburgh after the end of term. It was a perfect coming together of needs, and suddenly the club was able to support a women's team. The university girls - including Katie McGill, Ollie Rae and Ruth Willis - were able to provide coaches for the younger girls from time to time. The rest, as they say, is history. Eric continued his vital role for a number of years and was deservedly awarded the Jappy trophy in 2013 for this important contribution to the club's development.

When Eric was asked recently for his reflections on the challenges of coaching girls as opposed to boys, he said the main thing he noticed was there there were more gymnastics going on in the outfield, with cartwheels a particular favourite.



But, more seriously, Eric warmly remembers a tense match in which Lisa Thomson bowled a brilliant final over to clinch a victory against Watsons, dismissing future star internationalist Sarah Bryce in the process. Lisa also went on to international honours before forsaking cricket for basketball.

Lisa can be seen in the photograph along with current Carlton star and internationalist Hannah Rainey. <u>In NL 4 Hannah recalled the</u> fun on Friday nights.



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GIRL POWER - 1920's style

Many years before the WPL, the Challenger League or the current u15 Hardball and u12 squads, girl cricketers were made most welcome at Grange Loan. The archives recall matches in the distant past between Carlton and Craigmount Girls' School (which was situated in what is now Wyvern Park). While the school had its own playing field in Oswald Road (now covered in flats) they also made use of Grange Loan and a challenge match became a regular feature. With some allowances made (Carlton's leading batters were required to bat left-handed) these matches were enjoyable competitive. The school moved to the Borders in 1952 and closed in 1966.




Above - a contemporary advertisement for Craigmount School - identifying Physical Culture among its offerings.

U15 Disappointment

Hopes were high that having captured the Scottish ECB u15 Trophy, Carlton's u15 could successfully defend the national title.

However, despite convincingly overcoming Benwell Hill and Carlisle (photo above), things didn't go so well in the Northern Region Finals at Neston on 29 July.

In the semi-final against Nottinghamshire side Cuckney CC, they made a valiant attempt but narrowly failed to chase down the total of 125, finishing 12 runs short. In the third place play-off they found Didsbury CC too strong, but proudly went down fighting. They did the club proud.

Cuckney narrowly lost the final to Yorkshire club Wykeham CC, who go on to the next round as worthy Northern Champions.

Neston CC is a splendid place to play cricket, but it seems to be an unhappy hunting ground for Carlton. This is the third regional final that Carlton has played there - in 2021 and 2022 the u13s similarly failed to progress.

Congratulations to John Beattie on his performance as Oberon in the Edinburgh Acting School's recent production of A Midsummer Night's Dream. The Arrow's theatre critic was there:

'While there is much to enjoy in this updated production, for the cricketer interest is limited. The set in which the action takes place is barely recognisable as a cricket ground. The Carlton audience is used to Mr Beattie's performances relying on sound. if unspectacular, defence. It was thus unprepared for his innings as Oberon. Donning a costume which would not look out of place in the IPL, he swings at every delivery. In this flamboyant mood he might even be tempted to run three, a factor could be behind his disagreement with his partner Titania which is part of the play's convoluted plot. Meanwhile around the boundary a group of cricketers from what seems to be the Mechanicals CC engage in net practice. The cricketer's interest rises when one of them proclaims 'I, be Wall.' but in truth his characterisation bears disappointingly little resemblance to Raul Dravid, and the prospect of a match saving innings recedes.

'The course of true love, the poet tells us, never did run smooth. But neither does an innings of the Carlton 5th XI, and it was perhaps an opportunity missed that this production, despite its many other merits, was unable to shed light on the mysteries of ESCA Div 7. '

When I got to Victory Park (Meigle's ground) I was both nervous and excited but the nerves quickly faded away when all the team welcomed me to the 1s.

After bowling them out for 159 I didn't think I'd be required to bat as I was originally down at number 9 but with 10 runs to win, Lewis and Dan both agreed to put me in at number 6 so I had a chance to score my first runs for the 1st XI.

I went in to bat with Angus who was on 59 and I managed to score a couple of runs before he hit a six to win the game.

It was a great experience and really good fun and I can't wait to play for the 1s again.

Starting Young

The record books were out again when James made his First XI debut. At 15 years, 6 months, 14 days could he be Carlton's youngest ever First Teamer? Recent Young Pretenders Cheeky, Harris, Rudi were all older.

But James just fails to knock Fraser Watts off the perch. When Fraggle made his first appearance for the First XI on 9 July 1994, against Watsonians at Myreside, he was 15 years, 1 month and 4 days young.

It was not a great debut - Fraggle batted 8 and was run out for 1 as Carlton were dismissed for 167. Skipper Andy Macpherson was Carlton's top scorer with 51. Carton's total was far short of what was required and Watsonians overtook it with 5 wickets to spare.

Remarkably in those far off days when photographs were rare, Fraggle's publicity machine was well-oiled (even at his tender age) and a Scotsman photographer snapped his dismissal.


While Fraggle remains the youngest debutant There is still scope for James to overtake Fraggle's other records:

1st 1st XI - 50 30 August 1997 - 68 v Freuchie (18 years, 2 months, 25 days)

1st 1st XI century - 29 August 1998 v Falkland - 104 (19 years, 2 months, 24 days)

Fraggle first played for the Second XI on 25 July 1992 at the age of 13 years, 1 month, 20 days and scoring his first Second XI 50 against Stenhousemuir on 28 August 1993 aged 14 years, 2 months, 23 days.

But he is not the youngest Second XI debutant. That honour falls to Angus Beattie who made his Second XI debut on 12 May 2013 v Edin Accies aged 12 years, 10 months and 19 days. Angus opened the bowling with skipper Brad Mackay, and took 1-11 off 5 overs.

Carlton is proud to welcome the arrival of a new bench at Grange Loan. It has been donated in memory of, and tribute to, Sandy Scotland.

It recognises Sandy's long service to Scottish cricket over 37 years as an umpire and administrator.

Sandy retired from umpiring in 2019 when, freed of the official's need to unaffiliated, he joined Carlton. As he remarked at the time, and observed in the <u>Arrow Issue 24</u>, even though retired he found himself umpiring more frequently as he stood in many junior and lower XI matches.

Sandy died in August 2022, and in recognition of his unique contribution, and his friendship with Carlton his ashes were spread at Grange Loan.

These were the only wickets taken in a steady batting performance that was restricted well through accurate bowling and skilled fielding by the youngsters. The young batters were never quite able to keep up with the required rate despite some impressive skills, including Arjun reverse sweeping his dad for 4.

A thoroughly good natured, competitive and enjoyable occasion ended with adults preserving dignity, hamstrings and shoulder joints, well aware that a year from now the result would probably be very different.



PRIMARY FUN

As the school holidays begin, so ends another all too short but busy Primary School team season. An impressive record of 9 wins from 11 games was founded on the team's relentless bowling which produced almost 100 wickets in the 11 short games. Boom Boom - Mike Kennedy

The 4th of July is an historic date for many reasons. For Carlton fans it is honoured as the day the legend of Boom Boom Mike Kennedy was born. Mike scored 103, with 11 6s and 5 4s, for the Fourth XI at Peebles. He became the first batter to notch a century for the Fourth XI.

Mike had not played at Peebles since his great innings. But the 5th XI met Peebles in a league fixture earlier this season. Mike was on the team sheet - Carlton aficionados keenly anticipated a repetition of the whirlwind innings. So did Mike. Sadly it didn't quite happen.

Mike's cricket cricket philosophy is based on the belief every ball should be hit for six. He reflects on what Carlton means to him.

I joined Carlton 20 years ago this year when there were only 3 XIs, the current pavilion was still being planned and the nets were old and prone to random bounces. Since then I have managed to stay at the club as it has conveniently kept adding XIs accommodating my level of cricket. These XIs were created under thoughtful captains such as Bob Irvine and the Murray brothers. They all brought a similar philosophy which was that we were to be serious and competitive but the main goal of the "senior" players in the "lower" teams was to help and support the juniors in their entry into senior cricket and to make it fun.

So why do I I keep coming back now that I am into my 60s? Well, there is always the camaraderie that comes from a team sport where all members work together to support each other to achieve a collected goal. But for me it is the pleasure in helping the younger players come along.

They arrive barely being able to hit the ball off the square and progress to plundering 6s in a few short years. They remind me why we all got into sport in the first place. It is all about the joy of taking part, the optimism and conviction that we will get better and having the inexhaustible energy and passion to achieve it. I try and tap into that every season and while I hope we "senior" players do help the juniors progress up the ranks they should know it is a joy and a privilege to share their youth and enthusiasm which helps us cope with with our journey back down! The good days in cricket tend to stay with you and the bad days are soon forgotten.

A STICKY START

Before becoming a regular at Carlton in 2004, Mike had guested on a few occasions. His first recorded outing for Carlton was on 2 August 2002. The Carlton 3rd XI played Crammond CC at Roseburn.

It was not a great day for Carlton - or for Mike. They lost by 4 wickets, having slumped to 38 all out. Mike batted 4 and failed to trouble the scorers.

Also in the Carlton ranks that day were a number of familiar faces - Brian Forrester, Dave Carter (who snaffled 3 wickets) and 13-year-old Ali Evans.

TRAVELLER'S TALES

Mike is an enthusiastic traveller. He is currently unavailable for the Fifth XI being on a kayak expedition to view Arctic whales, and will be pedaling around Norway for most of August.

Mike has cycled across every continent. In 2012 during his cycling trip around India he reported back to Carlton on how he joined some enthusiastic local cricketers:

"Had my first "game" yesterday. The wicket was the pavement of a 14th Century fort, the stumps a 600 year old fence and the boundary the 30ft high fort walls. I was bowled 3rd ball with a rubber ball using a paddle like bat. I think I made the wee boy's day! They are all SO keen and play on any piece of earth with any type of bat & ball. This is true grass roots cricket but without the grass!"

'Got in another "game of cricket" today against the Coffe XI (see pic below) and managed a six first ball and then "retired" a few balls later to allow them to continue their game. I feel a bit better about my spring "training" now!'



50 Years of Carlton Success The Masterton Final Through The Years

There was disappointment as Carlton lost out in the final of this year's Masterton trophy, failing to add to their record 16 victories in the competition.

This was Carlton's 24th appearance in the final - also a record.

This year marks the 50th Anniversary of their first Masterton success. While the competition started in 1964, Carlton did not enter until 1968. It took them 6 years to reach their first final in 1974, and their first title.

They needed two attempts to get their hands on the trophy. The match against Royal High FP was evenly balanced when it was abandoned in the rain. The teams returned to Ferryfield two nights later when Carlton made 113-4 in their 25 overs, largely thanks to Fraser Dall's 60*. RHSFP could only manage 98-8 and skipper Alun Davies held the trophy aloft for the first time.

Carlton v Grange

Carlton and Grange have met in the Masterton final on 9 occasions, with Carlton coming out on top 6 times.

Carlton's most recent victory over Grange was at Grange Loan in 2021 when Tom Simpson's 70* was the foundation of Carlton's total of 152-7. A strong performance in the field, with a unforgettable match-winning catch by Arun Pillai (below) and 3 wickets for Angus Beattie, held Grange to 127-8.



By a strange coincidence 127 was the total Carlton put on the board in their previous final against Grange in 2014, also at Grange Loan. Fraser Watts scored 50 but none of the other batters could get going and, despite 4-19 from Chayank Gosain, Grange overtook the total with 3 wickets in hand. But 127 was a winning score against Grange in 2010, photo below.

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Of Carlton's 8 losing finals, 3 have been to Grange, who are second in the line of all time winners with 12 victories.

More Masterton Final Facts

Carlton's total of 177-5 in this year's final was the third highest total in their 24 finals. Their highest was 190-5 in 1995, powered by 76 from David Ponniah, which beat Heriot's by 45 runs.

In 2022, unusually batting second, Ali Shah's 92* meant that Carlton equalled Heriot's total of 187 but agonisingly lost out having lost more wickets.

Carlton's lowest winning total in the final was 108-7 in 2007 against Grange, who were then dismissed for 79 with Ali Evans taking 3-15.

Carlton have twice won the Masterton three years in a row - between 2006-8 and 2010-12. On each occasion they have been losing finalists in the subsequent year.

In only 5 of their 24 finals have Carlton batted second. 2 of these have ended in victory. In 2011 they dismissed Grange for 124, New Zealand amateur Jason Trembath taking 4-13 and, with Fraser Watts scoring 60*, won by 8 wickets. Their other victory chasing was in 1988 at Portgower Place when, having held Heriot's to 111, David Ponniah's 42* ensured victory by 6 wickets. Ponniah finished the match in style with a big six in the last over.

National T20

In 2008, the National T20 Finals were inaugurated, known initially and until 2019 as the Murgatroyd T20 Cup. The winners of the regional T20 competitions played off for the title of National Champions.

Carlton were the first winners of this title photo right. Rain on the August Finals day at Poloc meant that play was abandoned after the semi-finals. The final itself was postponed to a chilly day at Grange Loan at the start of the 2009 season.

A strong all round bowling performance, including 3 wickets for Cedric English, held Dunfermline to 92-9.

Although Carlton lost 3 quick wickets, a solid partnership between Bryn Lockie (24*) and Stevie Gilmour (44*) saw them home to win by 7 wickets.



Carlton have won the National Title a record 5 times and been runners up once.

Current champions Forfarshire, who overcame Carlton in last year's final to win their fourth title, have been runners up 3 times, twice to Carlton.

Masterton Final 1994

The early 90s were a period of Masterton dominance for Carlton. They were finalists each year between 1990 and 1996 winning 3. In 1994, as the Scotsman's report below makes clear, their 9th capture of the trophy win owed much to skipper Andy Macpherson's unbeaten innings of 75. In 37 Masterton innings, this was Andy's highest score. The photo right shows Andy with the trophy and then fiance Karen after the match. (The eagle eyed might spot the young Fraser Watts behind the pillar on the right.) Andy recalls a tense final.



The Masterton Trophy win in 1994 remains a vivid memory - though scary that it is some 30 years ago! A sunny evening attracted a big crowd against local rivals Watsonians. We batted first. Tim Bunker swung the ball early on and I was lucky to survive until, thankfully, he finished his spell and disappeared to fine leg for the rest of the innings! Class act David Ponniah gave the innings real momentum hitting a number of forceful boundaries (quick singles or hard run twos were not "Poon's" speciality!) and went on to score a quick fire 49. Upping the tempo towards the end, we posted a challenging 175. Watsonians responded well from the start and were up with the rate for a large part of their innings. Seamer Richard Bannerman, made for Masterton matches with an ability to bowl "yorkers" at will, again took key wickets, bowled tightly at the end and ran out Scottish internationalist Kenny Scott. A young Duncan Hodge, of future 2000 Calcutta Cup glory for Scotland, showed his promise as a cricketer before Bannerman dismissed him for a gallant 45, that had taken his team to the brink of a tremendous run chase. We fielded well towards the end and a key runout by Alan "Spike" McLeod meant they fell only 9 runs short, keeping the large crowd on their toes to the end. Both teams enjoyed a few beers afterwards in the late evening sun with Tim Bunker giving me a hard time about my early innings good fortune. Such is cricket!

Captain Macpherson leads Carlton to narrow victory

AN inspirational innings by their captain, Andy Macpherson, ensured that Carlton's trophy cabinet will not be empty at the end of the season.

Carrying his bat for 75, the opener steered his side to a nine-run victory over spirited Watsonians in the final of the Bell Lawrie White Masterton Trophy at the Grange Loan ground in Edinburgh last night. More than 400 spectators enjoyed the occasion.

Though he struggled early in his innings, playing and missing four times in an over from a frustrated Tim Bunker, Macpherson attacked the bowling towards the end, and he and David Ponniah were largely responsible for Carlton reaching 175 for four in their 25 overs. and he took a fine catch to dismiss the hard-hitting Flan-

Macpherson, who won the man-of-the-match award, hit one massive six and nine fours and Ponniah two sixes and seven fours in a gem of an innings from the tall Sri Lankan. Ponniah, one of whose sixes dented a new Renault in Grange Loan, looked set for a big score, but was well caught by Keith Flannigan off Mike Leonard for 49.

Watsonians made an impressive reply, and had 15 on the board after three overs, but a smart bit of fielding and an excellent throw by bowler Richard Bannerman saw Kenny Scott run out.

When Bannerman bowled Leonard in his next over, the Myreside men were up against it. Indeed, Bannerman could not be kept out of the action,

and he took a fine catch to dismiss the hard-hitting Flannigan off spinner Alan McLeod.

However, with 19-year-old Duncan Hodge batting well, Watsonians were almost up with the required run rate. Mark Everett, though, was next to go, bowled by Scott Baker for seven, making it 82 for four in the 15th over.

With Hodge threatening to turn the game his side's way, it was Bannerman who struck again, bowling the youngster for a fine 45.

When McLeod's magnificent throw had David Rainey run out, the task for Watsonians proved too much, though Malcolm Heggie hit a quickfire 29, and Martin Macari finished off the match in style with a six propelled out of the ground.

MASTERTON MACPHERSON

Andy Macpherson played a key role in another Carlton final victory. In 1988, the club's 125th Anniversary year, he took 3-34 and executed a quick thinking run out which limited Heriot's to 111-8. While Andy was at the crease at the moment of victory, the Carlton innings owed much again to David Ponniah with an undefeated 42. (The pictures of Andy in action are not taken from this match.)

HANDY ANDY KEY MAN AS CARLTON TAKE CUP

Carlton Cricket Club added gloss to their 125th anniversary celebrations when they captured the Masterton Trophy for the third time by overcoming both Heriot's and late drizzle at Raeburn Place last night.

Although the winning margin was six wickets, and Carlton had two overs to spare in passing a 111-8 total, the clash between the only two East Division One clubs who do not employ a professional was perhaps closer than a glance at the scorebook might suggest.

Brilliant

But an attack which clearly missed international slow bowler Euan McIntyre failed to match the penetration of Jum Govan and Andy McPherson while George Innes reeled off seven overs at a cost of just 17 runs.

Gradually lengthening his run, McPherson recied in Heriot's after they had put on 52 for the first wicket in the 13.5 overs.

His brilliant piece of fielding to dismiss Ian McKinlay was another decisive factor.

Lingering outside his crease on being caught by McPherson off a no-ball, McKinlay was startled by the bowler's spontaneous reaction, breaking the stumps from halfway up the wickel.

Punishment

With Ian Thompson notching the only boundary, extraswere, in fact, Heriot's top scorer, 13 of them leg byes.

In the reply Hugh Parker inflicted punishment on Andrew Ker and Jim Govan was even more aggressive before falling to a superb running catch by Steve Thomson.

That, however, brought in Fromisah who steered Cariton home, sealing victory with a magnificent six off Scott Foster which also signalled the 100 in what proved to be the concluding over.

Carlton Records in the Masterton

Going Big

The total of 265-3 against Edinburgh Accies in the Masterton tie on 21 May this year is Carlton's highest score in the competition. However Chris McBride's 163 (off 65 balls with 14 4s and 11 6s) fell narrowly short of the record Carlton innings in the competition.

In May 2018, newly arrived Australian pro Michael Castle blasted 181* off the hapless Edinburgh CC attack. He faced 75 balls, hitting 18 4s and 12 6s. Carlton's total of 249-2 was at the time the highest total in the competition. Carlton won by 93 runs.

Carlton went on to win the Masterton that season overcoming RH Corstorphine, who had Majid Haq in the line up, in the final at Grange Loan. Castle couldn't quite repeat his mighty innings, falling early for a mere 1. The Carlton total of 132-7 owed much to Hugo Southwell's watchful 58. Castle then took 2 wickets for 7 runs as Carlton bowled RHC out for 104.

Chris' century is the 5th by a Carlton batter in the competition. In addition to Mike Castle, Hugo Southwell twice scored 102 - in 2018 v Edin Accies at GL (52 balls 13 4s, 3 6s) and in 2021 v Watsonians at Myreside (41 balls, 7 4s 8 6s. Arun Pillai scored 110* v Penicuik at Kirkhill in 2022, 58 balls, 11 4s 6 6s).



High Totals

Carlton first topped 150 against Watsonians in 2009, scoring 169-3 at GL - Gordon Drummond 78*. They first went past 200 in 2017 when they scored 241-2 against Musselburgh, with Tom Simpson (below) scoring 97 and Ali Shah 87*. They then bowled Musselburgh out for 20 - winning by 221, the highest margin of victory in the competition.



Carlton's total of 265-3 against Edinburgh Accies this season is the first time they have topped 250.

Heriot's are the only club to have gone higher, having done so on two occasions. In 2023 they scored 295-3 against Edin Accies (with Ryan Brown scoring 174), bettering the 270-2 they scored the previous year against Edinburgh CC.

Low Totals

Carlton are responsible for inflicting the competition's two lowest totals on opposing teams. In 2001 they bowled Musselburgh out for 15, Gavin Lowrey taking 6-4, and as mentioned above bowled the same club out for 20 in 2017 (Michael Herdman 4 for 0, Omar Ahmad 3 for 9)

Carlton's lowest total was in 2016's semi-final when they were all out for 36 to Grange at Portgower Place. They lost by 10 wickets.

Fraser Watts is Carlton's highest run scorer in T20 with 1097 in 40 innings. He scored 7 half-centuries and his top score is 97*, against Penicuik in 2005. Watts is closely followed by Bryn Lockie with 1074 runs in 47 innings, 6 half-centuries and top score 81*, and Jamie Kerr 1057 (59 innings), 9 scores over 50 and a top score of 91. Hugo Southwell is the only other player to have over 1000 T20 runs (1005 in 36 innings) - two centuries and 5 half-centuries.

Bowling

By taking 5-23 against RHC in this year's semi-final, Lewis O'Donnell (below) became the 17th Carlton bowler to bag a Masterton 5-fer. But he is only the second to do so in a final. The other is Shujaa Khan with 6-12 in the 2023 final.



George Innes (below left) took 5 Masterton wickets 4 times between 1972 and 1984. Jim Govan did it twice in 1988 and 89.

Peter Aspinall (below rt) was the first, with 5-14 against Watsonians in 1968, the first year Carlton entered the competition. Despite his efforts Carlton lost.



Prior to Lewis and Shujaa's hauls, the most recent 5-fer was by Ali Evans, who took 5-10 against Heriot's in 2021's semi-final.

In addition to Shujaa Khan, 3 Carlton bowlers have taken 6-fers:

Gavin Lowrey - 6-4 v Musselburgh in 2001 Arun Pillai - 6-14 v Edin Accies in 2022 Charles Stronach 6-20 v Stenhousemuir in 1996.

George Innes is the leading wicket taker with 84 wickets in 48 matches - well ahead of his nearest rival Alun Davies who took 42 in 46 matches. Of more recent bowlers, who have to operate with tighter restrictions on numbers of overs, Ali Evans has 56 wickets in 53 ties and Arun Pillai 42 in 46.

MICHAEL CASTLE

Castle's arrival at Grange Loan for the 2018 season had been delayed by an administrative snarl-up over his visa. He had finally got to Edinburgh and on the day of the Masterton tie against Edinurgh was fresh off the plane. It had been planned to let him rest before a spot of junior coaching the following day. But a late withdrawal from the selected team meant that he strapped on his pads to open the innings blast his way to 181* and enter the record books.

In the Masterton he played 7 matches and scored 391 runs and took 12 wickets with a best of 4-20 against Grange in the semi final.

In 14 league and cup matches he scored 563 runs with a top score of 90 against Watsonians at Myreside and 3 other half centuries. He took 16 wickets with a best of 5-17 v Arbroath at Lochlands.

An enjoyable aspect of Mike's tenure at Grange Loan was his delegation of nets management and training to his wife Lisa.

Castle had previously played in NSW for Penrith CC, also home to present Aussie skipper Pat Cummins.

He may be better remembered in Australia for his part in a controversial incident a few years earlier when he was skipper of another suburban Sydney side Parramatta.

In late 2014 Australian skipper Michael Clarke was fighting to overcome hamstring and back injuries. To prove his fitness to selectors ahead of the first Test of the summer against India he opted to play for Grade club Wests in a 2 day match against Parramatta.

Castle was stunned when Wests captain asked him at the toss to let his side bowl first, in order for Clarke to bat on the second day of the match having an extra day to rest his injury. Castle disregarded the request and sent Wests into bat and was even more stunned when when they declared at 17-0. Annoyed, Parramatta considered declaring themselves when they reached 18, but soldiered on to 140-2, securing vital first innings league points.

Following an investigation, Cricket NSW, who disputed the the suggestion that they had pressured Wests to ensure Clarke batted, criticised Wests' skipper for putting an individual before the game.



Clarke was deemed fit enough to be selected for the First Test and led Australia to victory. During his innings his back injury flared up again and he retired hurt on 61 returning the next day to score 128 (below). It was his final test on Australian soil and the last of his 28 centuries.



GAVIN LOWREY

Gavin Lowrey has Carlton's best bowling figures in the Masterton with 6-4 against Musselburgh in 2001.

Between 1998 and 2002 the medium pacer played 82 First Team matches, taking 99 wickets. In 11 Masterton matches he took 17 wickets and had his highest score at the crease 58*. He was Best Bowler in 2002 with 27 wickets at 14.96.

My time at Carlton was a good one, I'd arrived in 1998 and played 5 seasons having moved up from the North East of England and walked into a season where it was the organisation of the teams into the SNCL, so your place in your qualifying group determined which division you were in the following season.

It was also Cedric English's first season as Pro which was a massive boost for the club.

I found the East/West divide between teams give a bit more of an edge to the fixtures, and made it very similar to the Durham Senior League that I was used to playing in.

We did well and landed a spot in the Premier Division, finishing second to West of Scotland in Group B

Over my 5 seasons we always did well but never really went on to push for the league title.

I always liked playing in the Masterton Trophy as it was fun and unpredictable and I am lucky enough to have the club's best bowling figures in the competition with 6-4 against Musselburgh.

It's all a bit of a haze, but I remember thinking when we arrived at their ground that it was a definite "Win the toss and bowl wicket" if you could put the ball in the right place, you'd get the rewards, and fortunately I did.

We won the trophy that year so it was nice to have played some part in that triumph for the club.

I only played one more season after that, as my body was beginning to fail me and me opening the bowling off five paces while Cedric hurtled in off his long run certainly baffled and amused the opposition while not exactly filling them with fear

That final summer was a good one as I won the club's bowling trophy and was in the top 10 for the league averages so it was certainly nice to sign off on a high, even if I didn't exactly scare the opposition!
