


A Word from the Coach



First XI

Our eason began with a loss against Heriot's, but we quickly turned things around. In the second game, Dan Da Costa scored a century and Chris McBride delivered an extraordinary double century, leading us to a series of four consecutive league victories. The fourth win was a hard-fought match away at Falkland, where Angus Beattie and Rudy Adair secured the victory with a crucial 20-run last-wicket partnership, chasing a modest 115.

We had several thrilling finishes throughout the season. In the first Masterton fixture, Lewis O'Donnell hit a six over long off the second last ball to clinch a dramatic victory against Watsonians. Unfortunately, we then faced a tough period with four consecutive league losses, which potentially jeopardized our title hopes. However, we bounced back with a couple of impressive away wins, notably against Forfarshire, where Chris' five-wicket haul helped bowl them out for under 100. He also picked up another five-wicket haul against Falkland and had a stellar season overall, contributing 1,281 runs and 23 wickets across all formats.



Arun's 124 v RHC was his third century for Carlton in all formats.

Angus Beattie demonstrated his batting prowess on more than a few occasions, but he truly excelled with the ball, taking an impressive 34 wickets at an average of around 19. Yet, the standout performer in terms of wickets was Lewis O'Donnell, who claimed 65 wickets at an average of 13.65. His haul included 49 wickets in league and cup fixtures, with five-wicket hauls in league, cup, and Masterton games. In the cup fixture against West of Scotland, Lewis took six wickets, while Ruaridh McIntyre, contributed four wickets, taking all 10 between them and will be honoured on the Carlton Wall alongside Chris and Dan, who put on a 205-run partnership against Meigle early in the season.

Under Dan's leadership, we progressed unbeaten to the Masterton finals, defeating Watsonians and Grange in the round-robin stage, and Corstorphine in the semi-finals, where a stunning catch from Rory Allardice dismissed the dangerous George Munsey. In the finals, despite having Grange at 124 for 6 and a possible national final in sight, our total of 177 was not enough. Their seventh wicket added 56 runs, ultimately securing their victory.

Returning to the league, we managed to get back to winning ways and scored 326 against Grange, reigniting hopes for the title. However, a 200-plus run stand for the fifth wicket by the opponents, coupled with less-than-ideal bowling, allowed Grange to reach the target with 14 balls to spare. We were also knocked out of the Cup in the quarterfinals by Heriot's, who proved a tough match-up for us this season, having defeated us three times.

Earlier, Dan had scored his second century of the season against Aberdeenshire in the second round of the Cup, and then a third in the final league game, now standing at seven centuries over two seasons. We ended the season by winning three out of our last four league games, finishing sixth. Although not where we hoped to be, there's always next season to look forward to. I also look forward to the Stronach brothers, James and Ben, and Jamie Beattie who along with Chris were the debutants for the Carlton 1st XI this season and hope will make regular appearances in the future. For now, we rest our bow and arrows, ready to "Nock, Draw, and Loose" again next summer!

They are in the process of appealing this decision, so hopefully this will be resolved quickly so that we know if we have finished first or second.

Fortunately, whatever happens, we have been promoted back to the Championship after only one year away.

Amazingly, with 2 games to go and only 1 loss to our name all season, we still needed to win one of them and a get a minimum of 6 bonus points from the other to guarantee second spot and promotion. Ben Thurman returned to the 2's after a number of seasons, bringing some much needed experience. He had his best ever season for the 2s, scoring over 300 runs. Ben D'Ulisse scored almost 250 runs including an excellent 94, falling just short of a well deserved hundred. James Stronach (15) scored his maiden 2's 50 as did Rory Ledingham. Along with a number of others, it's great to see the younger players working their way through the teams and continuing to improve.

Bowling wise we have been lucky at Carlton for a number of years to have a 'seamingly' (get it....) never ending supply of good bowlers. This year was no different with 7 bowlers taking more than 10 wickets. But **Mike Kennedy** has other ideas and with an almighty swing deposits a huge 6 amongst the unwary sunbathers scattering them every which way and putting Carlton on the path to victory..



At GL the 2s reach the last over against Drummond Trinity needing 12 to overtake their imposing total of 263. Max, newly arrived at the crease,

pushes the first ball for a single. 11 still needed. Skipper **Charles Stronach** then dispatches the second ball into the bushes up the hill for 6 (only the 5th maximum of his entire career).

Three off the next ball leaves Max at the business end with 2 needed. He prods and somehow a catastrophic misfield allows them to scramble 2 (see below) and bring the 2s home to a season defining win.





In the end of season friendly with MCC, **Jamie Beattie** joins brother Angus at the crease with the score on 88-5 - a long way behind. 13 overs later he sweeps Grange's Charlie Peet

for 4 to bring up the 100 partnership - the first between brothers for Carlton.

A WHOLE LOTTA CRICKET GOING ON

Martin Firth takes another dive into treasure trove of stats that is Pitchero.

As the 2024 season comes to an end, here is the third annual dive into the treasure trove of statistics that Pitchero offers. This is largely for entertainment - for several reasons our data in Pitchero isn't 100% reliable, so any analysis is at least partly fiction. I'm pretty sure that makes it prime material for The Arrow!

Pitchero reports that we scheduled 325 fixtures, and played 270. It is an indication of the disruption caused by this year's poorer weather that 305 matches took place last year.

It will be no surprise to anyone that the 5s top the list with 35 fixtures played, a testament to Keith Murray's labours to arrange an extensive and enjoyable mid-week programme. This is followed by the 1s with 28 matches (only 2 league fixtures fell to the weather), and the PS Team with 19 - another testament to the effort that Euan Sweet has put into playing fixtures throughout the summer holidays as well as during term time.

101 senior players played at least one fixture.

- Sarah Beith tops the list for the second year in a row with an astonishing 35 appearances she is truly Carlton's Ms Cricket. She was closely followed by Keith Murray with 32. Dan Da Costa, Ru Main and Lewis O'Donnell each played 28, closely followed by most of the regular 1s players.

- Looking just at league and cup fixtures, Sarah, Dan, Ru & Lewis are joined by Chris McBride, all with 25.

- Keith (16) and Sarah (10) top the list of friendly fixtures played, followed by Dougie Firth & Stu Dawson (8).

79 junior players played at least one senior fixture.

- Top of this list is Aggie Foley with 24, followed by Aadi Khadse & Shreyas Tekale (both 21) and Benji Risi (19).

- Looking only at league and cup fixtures, Aggie is still top with 22, then Aadi (18), James Stronach (14), Abby Caton & Benji (13).

- It is a telling indication of how Women's cricket is growing at Carlton that 5 of the top 10 juniors playing senior league and cup cricket are girls: Keira Ansell, Elsie Fraser and Sonia Amin join Aggie and Abby in the top 10.

One of my favourite things about Carlton is that families play the game together.

- We have two families with 4 active players: the Beatties and the Subrs, plus a further 10 families with 3 players and 5 with 2. As far as I know, the Subrs remain the only family at Carlton all of whom play. (Can Kelly be tempted onto the field?)

- The Khadses lead the list of fixtures played with 99, followed by the Beatties (82), Subrs (80), Foleys & Stronachs (both 67). With Aaradhy now playing senior matches, it looks like the Khadse's record will only grow in future years.


- It is an exceptional achievement by the Beatties to play 82 senior fixtures - the next highest is Subrs (50), followed by Al and Gavin Murray (49) and Keith and Robbie Murray (48).

- Looking just at senior league and cup fixtures, the Beatties remain top with 65, followed by the Stronachs (44), A Murray (39) and Subr (38).

- Finally, combining the Murrays (who are after all family by any reasonable definition), they top all the lists: 104 fixtures played, 97 senior fixtures, 67 league and cup fixtures.

BLAZERATTI



Dan Da Costa struck a blow for traditionalists in donning the Carlton blazer for the toss at the end of season match between Carlton and MCC. Fashion critics were quick to express their disappointment that the MCC skipper and Carlton legend Fraser Watts was not attired in the red and yellow MCC but adopted a more sober ensemble.

While the Carlton blazer has a long history dating from the early days of the club - it is first spotted in team photographs from the 1877s - the blazer Dan wore is one of 12 procured in 2013 in association with the club's 150th anniversary. The photo below shows 8 of the original owners at the anniversary dinner held, appropriately enough, in the Carlton Hotel.

Cricket can be a cruel game. This season saw Chris McBride dismissed twice in the 90's having done all the hard work. Similarly Dan Da Costa and Ben D'Ulisse (for the 2s) also had to trudge back to the pavilion thinking if only.....

This season's four 90s is a relatively healthy crop. History suggests that once a Carlton batter gets to 90, they are determined not to miss out. While there have been 100 centuries scored for the First XI since 1975, there have been only 37 scores in the 90s. For the 2nd XI, the same period has seen 48 centuries but only 27 90s.

There are some exceptions - in 2016 Hugo Southwell didn't convert any of his three 90s. He fell at 96 and 98 and was left stranded on 94* as Carlton's innings closed. He saved his tons for the Masterton.

If falling in the 90's is disappointing, being dismissed for 99 is doubly so. Two batters have experienced this disappointment for the First XI. Tom Simpson fell at the last in July 2021 against Watsonians (photo below).



While Tom had reached the three figures a month before his 99, the other batter dismissed on 99 failed to reach that landmark in his Carlton career of 55 innings between 1955 and 1958.

In June 1956 then skipper Bill Courtney was dismissed for 99 against Kirkcaldy at Grange Loan. His dismissal brought to an end a partnership of 219 with David Tattersall.

A feature of Saturday's games was the double century partnership of W. R. Courtney (99) and D. Tattersall (110 not out) for Carlton against Kirkcaldy at Grange Their victory by 129 runs Loan. over the Fife club was the surprise of the League season. Courtney was unfortunate to be out ibw his century when one short of Kirkcaldy made a disastrous start. losing three wickets for 8 runs. and they were all out for 90. Saville taking five wickets for 40. . Edinburgh

The Courtney-Tattersall partnership was only the third 200+ partnership in the club's history and the first over 200 partnership since 1934. It was marked by the award of tankards to the two batters shortly afterwards. The press photo shows Jim Fleming, who had been part of the 1934 partnership making the award.

Tattersall went on to 110* in that partnership. This was his second century in 26 innings for Carlton. The previous season he had scored 104 against Leith Franklin at Leith Links. He was Best Bat in 1957.

He was a Lancastrian and came to Edinburgh to study brewing. Another Tattersall, Roy, played for Lancashire and had 16 Test matches for England.



Only one Second XI batter has been dismissed for 99 - a discovery which brought distressing memories back to Brian Forrester,

'Batting first away to Freuchie 2nds in 1993, the game started in the second XI's usual manner - keeping the opening bowlers out. Ticking along at 3 runs per over, then upping the run-rate - the time when I'd normally get myself out. We'd got to the 41st over, still no 188 wickets down, on the board. faster-scoring batters in next - number 3 was David Ponniah, Alex Comer, Chris Kear, David McLean (now an umpire), Scott Fraser and David Carter all waiting to bat - time to attack! Dancing down the wicket in a vain attempt to clear extra cover, I was stumped by yards.

'The scorers were still adding up the runs as I trudged off, so it was only after a pause that I discovered I had succumbed one short of that elusive century. If batters' scores had been displayed, I'd have nudged yet another a single rather than attempt uncharacteristic heroics. Still, scoring 234 for 4, we won, which is what really mattered – and my batting average improved considerably.'

This was Brian's top score in 189 innings for the Second XI in which he scored 3870 runs leaving him by some way the 2s leading run scorer.





Stranded On 99*

A number of Carlton batters have found themselves stranded in the high 90's as they run out of partners or overtake the opposition total eg Hamish Gardiner was 98* v Arbroath in 2015 when the winning total was reached.

However there is only one batter in Carlton history who has been stranded on 99*.

In 2017, the Women played Geo Watson's at GL in a Cup semi-final, Katy McGill took 14 runs of the final over but was still left tantalisingly short of the magic figure. But she was delighted to learn of her place in Carlton's history books,

'Haha, what a claim to have! That's great to know. I do remember it happening. To be fair, whoever I was batting with at the very end, I owe big thanks to for getting that close definitely got screamed at to run hard! Having glanced at a few of the pics, I remember it being much sunnier than they show so I must have imprinted that on a very fun innings.'

Unfortunately Katie could not repeat the magic in the Final and Carlton lost to Watsonians. Katie is now based on Bristol and works in product design. She is Co-President of the Scottish Cricketers Association (taking over from Ali Evans) and has been working hard to help players prepare for the coming Women's World Cup.

Make Mine A Double

When Abbi Aitken-Drummond took 5-7 v WOS In 2001 Cedric English achieved the double Women on 9 June, she became only the fifth in the same season with 3 centuries and a player in Carlton's history to score a century and best bowling of 5-42. Although he had 15 take a 5-fer in the same season. She had other centuries and 3 other 5-fers for previously scored 101* against Stew-Mel on 12 Carlton, this was the only season in which Mav.



When Chris McBride took 5-26 against Forfarshire on 27 July, he became the sixth. Chris had 3 centuries under his belt prior to that date and would bag a further 5-fer.



The surviving record books show that the first player to do the double for Carlton was Scottish international James Aitchison. He is more celebrated as one of Scotland's greatest ever batters, but his medium pace took 33 wickets in his 33 matches for Carlton between 1955-58. In 1957 he took 5-41 against Stenhousemuir at the Tryst to bring victory. He was Best Bat and Best bowler in 1956.

he achieved both.

In 2022 Arun Pillai achieved the double in that season's Masterton matches - with 110* v Penicuik and 6-14 v Edinburgh Accies. In 2023 Shujaa Khan had a century in the EPL at Meigle and 6 wickets, including a double hat trick, in the Masterton Final against RHC. In league and cup cricket Shujaa had 3 centuries and one 5-fer, but not in the same season.

Nine other players have achieved this double for the First XI although not in the same season. They include Ali Evans and Stevie Gilmour. One other woman has achieved it - Olli Rae - who has 4 centuries to her name but only one 5-fer.

Earlier records are lost, but, given what is known generally about their performances, it is highly probable that some of the pre-war Carlton greats such as George Jupp, CS Paterson or Tom Crosskey achieved the double in the same season.

Two players have centuries and 5-fers for the Second XI - Stevie Elder and Chris Kear. For the 3rds only Akeel Aslam; and two for the 4s - Mike Kennedy and Fraser Allardice, who achieved both as a junior, taking 5-6 against Kismet in 2009 and scoring 103 against Fauldhouse 2 in 2011, which earned him an award from ESCA (below).

No player has scored 100 and taken 5 wickets in the same match for any of Carlton's teams.
