Martin's involvement with Carlton began when he brought his son Dougie to the Wednesday junior sessions. It is unlikely that when he first offered to help with a small bit of admin for KwikCricket, he thought that his contribution to the club would become so significant.

He rapidly became, and remains, an integral part of the club. As a member of the Junior Committee he undertook a variety of roles, including junior membership secretary. As a key member of the Management Committee, where amongst other things he has implemented and assisted the implementation of Pitchero throughout the club. He has ensured the system works seamlessly for everyone and the club has benefitted hugely from the work that Martin has done to bed the system in.

Despite Dougie long having graduated from Kwik Cricket, Martin continues to support junior events - indeed he set the template for the KwikCricket Festivals. As if that was not enough, he has established another highlight of the junior calendar in the form of the hugely enjoyed Carlton Junior Sixes.

Martin has also taken on an important role with ESCA where he has been instrumental in organizing the extensive junior game schedule, (benefitting Carlton enormously by limiting the number of away games and reducing the number of times that we have had to hire the Inch!)

He has also managed to make Carlton a full family affair by encouraging Mary to be the Club CWPO in recent years so I think it is fair to say that the Club has actually benefited hugely from the whole Firth family.

But Martin can also be a real "pitch-hero". He makes occasional appearances for both the 5th team and the Over 50s where he has contributed to a number of match-winning performances. "A recent cricketing highlight for avid followers of 5th XI cricket was a defiant match-high stand of 27 with Robbie Murray in the rain on a typically placid Meadows surface - Martin's 18 on that pitch was worth a half century anywhere else."

Martin's extraordinary commitment and contribution to Carlton CC are deeply appreciated by all. He is a worthy winner of the Jappy Trophy.

The Jappy Trophy is Carlton's highest accolade. It is named after Jimmy Jappy who, over a 33 year association with Carlton up to his death in 1980, worked tirelessly on the club's behalf. He served many years on Council, including 5 years as President, and performed just about every essential task around Grange Loan. Since 1981 the Jappy Trophy has been awarded to the person deemed to have made an outstanding contribution to the running of Carlton. A person can only be awarded it once. The full roll of honour can be seen on the club website.

Bob Marsden



In 65 first team matches for Carlton between 1986 and 1989, Bob Marsden scored 1797 runs at a average of 34.56. He scored one century - 130* in the 1988 cup tie against Northern Counties CC. He averaged 24.57 in the Masterton with a top score of 78.

He was Best Bat in 1987, 88 and 89.

Bob is now based in Buxton in Derbyshire where he still plays. He is currently Chair of Buxton CC and played last season for the Derbyshire over 60s select.

Bob shares some of his memories of happy years at Grange Loan.

I have so many happy memories of Carlton and it holds a very special place in my cricket affections. My introduction to the club was through the Authentics, Oxford University's second team, who for many years had an end of term tour of Scotland. In 1979 this involved fourteen lengthened by the Tics representing Oxford in the British Universities competition, organised by Carlton's John Hiley. A two week tour shows a different era with no student debt, long holidays and cheap petrol! Apart from Edinburgh clubs and schools we played Greenock, Stenhousemuir, Clackmannan and Cupar.

My Oxford contemporaries only recently were remembering a very late night at the Tryst. Older Carlton members will perhaps find it hard to believe that Morrison Zuill could be such a good host! The highlight of the tour was the game at Grange Loan, sponsored and hosted by Mrs Masterton, a very special day for the Tics and the club. It was always a very competitive game with a magnificent, long lunch with speeches and celebrations long into the night.

This was my first encounter with the never to be forgotten Alun Davies and George Innes!

In 1985 I moved north to teach History at Loretto School. Most Tics arriving in Edinburgh head to Grange. But I've always loved walled town grounds and to step through the gate at Grange Loan was always a thrill, a wonderful ground with its unique slope and lovely views of Arthur's Seat. In addition Carlton did not have a professional in those days and I admired that commitment. Most importantly, it was a friendly and welcoming club with great characters who loved the game and had high standards.

The East League was tough and competitive with lots of local derbies and some strong professionals. I remember a game at Kirkcaldy when the West Indian Test player Gus Logie beat us singlehanded! In addition there were memorable Scottish cup matches away at Kelso, Clydesdale, Aberdeen and Broughty Ferry. English cricketers find it hard to believe that one of the bounciest and quickest wickets I have ever played on was at Brechin!

For many years Carlton had been the bridesmaid in the East League, never having won the title but having got close many times. In 1988 under the calm, experienced captaincy of Hugh Parker, a well balanced side achieved great success.

Reading about that year's Masterton Cup final victory v Heriots in the recent Arrow I remembered that I took visiting friends to play golf at Gullane during the day. It was not the best preparation for an evening cup final. By 6pm I had sun stroke, a terrible migraine and was very tired. My performance reflected that. But good bowling and a smart run out by Andy Macpherson (but why did he bowl so many no balls?) and then hard hitting by the incomparable David Ponniah saw us to victory.

In the league we arrived at the last match needing victory over Kirkcaldy to win the title. I redeemed myself with 58 runs, only to be brilliantly caught by Indian Test player Raman at point. Thankfully the wily George Innes slipped one past Raman's defences and the soon to be a professional Jimmy Govan proved too good and the title was ours. Another great night followed! All players were in grounds teams and had to help prepare the wicket. I was more than happy to sit on the roller for half an hour rather than bowl in the nets! And the phrase "Cut, Water, Roll" has stayed with me at Buxton as I prepare wickets.

In 1995 I returned to Edinburgh as Chaplain at Fettes College. Running the cricket meant few opportunities at Grange Loan and Scottish cricket was changing with the introduction of the national league, more travelling, earlier start times and long warm ups!

In 1999 I moved to Buxton in Derbyshire. From a distance it has been great to see Carlton grow and flourish with more senior XIs, juniors, girls and women. I have regularly bumped into Richard Swan at Lord's test matches. What a great batter and captain he was and talking cricket with him is always interesting. Then it was a delight to meet Ali Evans, who played with my son Johnny in the Derbyshire 2nd XI for a couple of seasons.

In 1999 at the age of 40, I thought I had retired from club cricket. But Buxton were short of players and inevitably I started playing again. (Photo right) We are famous (or perhaps infamous) for being the ground where snow stopped play on 2 June 1975 in the game between Derbyshire and Lancashire.

Our magnificent ground, the Park, is at 1000 feet! I have been Chairman for the last eight years. It has been a privilege and a lot of hard work to see Buxton grow in much the same way that Carlton has.



We now have five Women's teams, thriving juniors and in 2025 we plan to start a 5^{th} Saturday Men's team.

Long may Carlton thrive and prosper, it's a very special club!

(And Andy, yes, I still have your Deacon Blue tape which you left in my car ... I became a fan but as music systems have moved on you won't be wanting it back.)



V OXFORD UNIVERSITY AUTHENTICS


CARLTON

While the Oxford University Authentics had toured Scotland for many years since the 1890s, with regular fixtures against Grange, Cupar and Perthshire amongst others, they did not visit Grange Loan until 1968. Fixtures were then annual until 1989 - at first 2 day, 4 innings matches reverting after 1974 to one day formats.

The two day match in 1969 was notable for the contribution of one D J S Currie. Currie was a dual member of Carlton and Heriots. In The Authentics first innings he took 3-61 in 23 overs. In the Carlton innings, and with the consent of the visitors, he retired on 5 - whereupon he took himself off to Goldenacre and scored 37*for Heriot's against Trinity Acads. He returned to Grange Loan the next day to complete his innings - finishing 7*. In the evening he assisted Heriot's win the final of the Masterton against Stenhousemuir. There is no mention of Currie in Carlton player stats, which suggests his primary allegiance was to Heriot's.

From the Carlton point of view the early fixtures with the 'Tics were dominated by all-rounder Chris Smith who scored 104 in the 1969 fixture and topped 50 in each of the next 3 years. Smith is the only Carlton player to score 100 in the fixture, although John Hiley scored 93* in 1973. In 1972 he took 5-41 - the only Carlton 5-fer in the fixture. In 1988, while internationalist Jim Govan took 4-52, Alasdair McLeod performed his magic at the other end to return 3-40.

Bob Marsden's first outing at Grange Loan was in 1980 when, opening the batting, he scored 30 before being bowled by Alun Davies. The match was drawn. The following year in another draw he scored 38, dismissed again by Davies, this time caught behind by R Young. His final visit in 1982 was less successful - he was caught behind by Brian Forrester off the first ball of the match. A duck was a rare occurrence for Bob - in 67 League Cup and T20 innings for Carlton he failed to get off the mark on only 3 occasions.

The Grandest Christmas Tree in Europe Can now be Seen Free of Charge



This advertisement from the Scotsman of 25 December 1863, the year of Carlton's founding, shows the seasonal delights that the initial members of the club could have enjoyed.

It reads:

Every Lady and Gentleman Boy and Girl should VISIT THE GRAND CHRISTMAS
TREE which is the Greatest, Most Splendid and Interesting Sight in the City.
ROYALTY IN OUR MIDST, and our Far Famed Modern Athens teeming with RANK, WEALTH, BEAUTY, and FASHION, it has behoved THOMAS STEVENSON to Prepare and Finish, on the most Gigantic and Elaborate Scale, the Grandest, Most Gorgeous and Magnificent CHRISTMAS TREE which has ever been exhibited in Christendom.

EVERY CAPITAL of NOTE in Europe has been Explored for Decided Novelties that are both Rich and Rare and these have been secured; FOREIGN and BRITISH ARTISTES of the Greatest Eminence and most Consummate Skill have been Engaged Regardless of Expense, and the result is the Production of a Right ROYAL CHRISTMAS TREE Worthy of Royalty, Worthy of the City which has given it birth, and Worthy of the Fame of the House in which it stands.

GREAT WAS THE SENSATION created last year, and unanimous in the Newspaper Press and the public in proclaiming 'THE KING OF CHRISTMAS TREES' unrivalled, still, by an extraordinary effort, and by dint of the most recent scientific appliances, it has been completely eclipsed by 'THE TREE' of 1863.

This wonder of the modern age was on view at Thomas Stevenson's Foreign and British Bazaar, 76-77 Princes Street (Corner of Hanover Street.) Why is this worthy of mention in The Arrow?

Several years after the exhibition of this phenomenon, in November 1875, Thomas Stevenson became a proud father for the second time. His new born son was christened **Norman Lang Stevenson** and would in the course of his long life do so much to ensure Carlton's place at the heart of Scottish cricket.



Something of a successor to Stevenson's Grandest Christmas Tree might have been found at Jenners whose splendid tree dominated its central atrium each year until the store closed in 2020.

Nevertheless there are still some impressive trees around - for example in the Dome.

However despite this fact, and although no player capped by Scotland has a Christmas birthday, a number of prominent cricketers were born on Christmas Day itself - or the adjacent days. As you will see from the following pages, these cricketing Christmas babies form a pretty handy team.

Strangely enough as far as cricketing goes, New Years Day is a significantly less favourable day to be born if you aspire to be a cricketer and the Hogmany XI failed to raise a team.

THE CHRISTMAS BABY XI

Alastair Cook (25-12-1984) - 161 Tests, 12,472 runs @ 45.35. Until overtaken recently by non-Christmas Baby Joe Root, England's record run scorer and century maker.

Marcus Trescothick (25-12-1975) - 76 Tests, 5825 runs @ 43.79. A tragic victim of mental illness which cut short his Test career. Now happily part of the England coaching set-up.

Simon Jones (25-12-1978) - only 18 Tests, 59 wickets @ 28.23, as a series of injuries prevented him becoming one of the greats. Made an unforgettable contribution to the 2005 Ashes triumph with his mastery of reverse swing.

Hedley Howarth (25-12-1943) - 30 Tests, 86 wickets @ 36.95, New Zealand's leading slow bowler of the time was often used in long spells to stem the flow of runs. At Lord's in 1973, he sent down 70 overs in the second innings, finishing with 4 for 144.

Clarrie Grimmet (25-12-1891) - 37 Tests, 216 wickets @ 24.21, didn't play Test cricket till he was 33, but went on to become the first bowler to take 200 Test wickets. His leg spin partnership with Bill O'Reilly is reckoned among the greatest bowling partnerships of all time.

Colin Cowdrey (24-12-1932) - 114 Tests, 7624 runs @ 44.06, everyone knows how he came out to face the W Indies quickies with his arm in plaster. The first player to appear in 100 Tests, which he marked with a century against Australia at Edgbaston in 1968. Cowdrey marked his 30th birthday by scoring 307 for MCC against S Australia.

Rohan Kanhai (26-12-1935) - 79 Tests, 6227 runs @ 47.53, honorary Aberdonian the West Indian great made 55 in his first one-day international and the same score in his last, at the age of 39, when he helped to win the first ever World Cup final, at Lord's in 1975.

Geoff Allott (24-12-1971) - 10 Tests, 19 wickets @ 58.47, New Zealand seamer who once batted for 101 minutes without scoring - the longest duck in Test history which helped New Zealand to a draw against South Africa at Auckland in 1998-99.

Barry Wood (26-12-1942) 12 Tests, 454 runs @ 21.61. He played his 12 Tests spread over seven seasons, making 90 on debut against Australia in 1972, but he never played more than three in a row. A gutsy opener he delivered consistently for Lancashire for whom he scored over 17,000 runs.

Matthew Wade (26-12-1987) 12 Tests, 623 runs @ 34.61, 36 dismissals. At 16, he was diagnosed with testicular cancer requiring two cycles of chemotherapy to defeat the illness. His big break arrived when Brad Haddin was forced to miss the 2012 Test series in the West Indies due to personal reasons and Wade grabbed the chance with a 106 in the third Test. An ankle injury cost him his Test spot in India a year later and a run of poor form meant he was axed from the one-day side too.

Mark Lathwell (26-12-1971) - 2 Tests, 78 runs. Potential unfulfilled - at the end of 1993 he was named the Cricket Writers' Young Player Of The Year. Hyped as England's great batting hope he played 2 Tests against Australia in 1993 and failed through nerves. His form collapsed and he drifted out of the game before he was 30.

A Christmas Scorer?

The team need a scorer - Carlton's own Ken Nisbet does not qualify, for he is a March baby. Failing him there can be no one better to count the balls and runs than Isaac Newton whose laws of motion explain much that happens in cricket, even though he probably had no direct experience of the game. He was born on Christmas Day 1642.
