Joining a new club is always a bit nerve wracking, especially for someone like me who is terrible at remembering names.

Once I got past that however, 2025 turned into one of my most enjoyable seasons of cricket for a long time. Yes, I wasn't all that certain how you can play cricket on a 45 degree slope, and yes, it was a bit of an unpleasant surprise to find myself on the old team in football one Saturday, but as the weeks went by these 'issues' fell by the wayside and I began to see the team for the close knit group that it is.

The way the team developed through the year, with juniors coming in and performing straight away demonstrated what a great environment the group and the club had created.

The clearest manifestation of this was our thumping win over Grange at home which was my undoubted highlight of the summer. Chasing 200+ in thirty overs against an attack boasting multiple internationals? Not many teams can manage that. Though such highs must inevitably come with similar lows, I do not think the season could be described as anything but a success and I can't stress enough just how welcome I have felt all year. Hopefully 2026 will see us take that final step to winning some silverware.

Having traded Edinburgh for London last September for employment reasons, I found myself unattached to a cricket club for the first time in close to two decades. Would this fresh start allow me, now deep into my mid-twenties, to step back gracefully from spending all my summer Saturdays in the embrace of amateur cricket? Alas, no. A message from a Uni friend, some gentle persuasion, and I found myself at the start of the season, trotting out for North Middlesex Cricket Club, under the guise of "only playing about half of the games".

Located in Muswell Hill (N London), the ground has the quirk of being within shouting distance of 4 other cricket clubs, allowing you to hear which rival team has just got a wicket, based on the volume of celebration. The field is short and wide, leading to some strange dimensions for the 1s, and the unique experience of fielding shoulder to shoulder on the boundary with someone from another game on a postage stamp of a pitch, as the 2s and 3s play simultaneously side by side.

I got to experience both of these, as I spent the season yo-yo-ing between the 1s and 2s (the Middlesex prem is somewhat stronger than the EPL). Nonetheless, after a couple of matches, I was completely sold, playing good quality cricket with great teammates who were all there with the right motivations. It reminded me of a certain South Edinburgh club for many reasons, including:

An incredibly strong junior section and a culture that supports development and remaining associated with the club, with one weekend 54 current/former juniors playing in senior matches (out of 77);

A genuine caring about every team doing well, not just the one you play for;

And finally, ample opportunity for post-match socialising with fun, welcome, interesting, people. It was also the club's 150th anniversary year, which meant there was a season long festival atmosphere, helped by some incredible on-pitch performances. In an unprecedented season, the 1s, 2s, and 3s all won their leagues (something never achieved by any club in the Middlesex league), as well as the women's team and the development/u21s also winning their respective competitions. Playing in the 2s title decider, being the next batter in during a nervy, low-scoring chase was one of the tensest times I've had on a cricket field, and was a testament to how much I cared already about the people and club, despite only being part of things a short time.

While Carlton will always be my club, I'm very happy to have had such a good experience at North Midd, and will no doubt be back to go around once more next year. Anyone who finds themselves in London could do far worse than end up at the Midd, and likewise hopefully I can convince anyone that if they find themselves in Edinburgh, then Carlton would be the club for them.

Shuttling between the club's top two teams Angus bagged 30 wickets at 12.8.

As reported in a local paper, the Camden New Journal at the end of June, he also took a hattrick - his first since an u13 match many years ago. It was not enough to bring victory however

Angus Beattie picked up the ball and quickly set about turning a topsy-turvy match back in North Midd's favour. Bowling with relentless accuracy throughout what was an economical 11.3-over spell, Beattie collected four wickets at the expense of just 26 runs.

### **Hat Tricks Hardly Happen**

Hat tricks are rare beasts. In the history of ODI cricket, comprising over 4900 matches, there have been only 52.

NL Stevenson may have bowled more overs in more matches than any Carlton player in a career of 50 years. But there is only one recorded instance of him doing the hat trick - in 1894 he took 3 in 3 for Old Blairlodgeans against Blairlodge, which he says brought him to the attention of Carlton for whom he debuted that same year. There is no record of him doing the trick for Carlton - although records are very incomplete so perhaps he did...who knows?

Carlton saw a a minor glut of hat-tricks in 2023 when Shujaa Khan memorably took a double hat-trick in the Masterton Final, and Maisie Maceira and Saskia Aldridge both had 3 in 3 in the WPL.

This year Carlton can celebrate 2 hat tricks. Hamish Turner did the deed for the Fourth XI at Grange Loan against Gala 2 on 13 July. While it's Hamish's first hat trick, it's his second 5-fer - in May 2022 he took 5-14 for the 5th XI against StewMel4. Read about Hamish's bowling spell below and watch it again on this link.

Also on the hat trick trail this year was Sonia Amin who did it against StewMel in the Challenger League.

NL Stevenson would be proud - but a tiny bit jealous too.

#### HAMISH'S 5-FER AND HAT TRICK

I started my spell down the hill and, to put it politely, it was dreadful. Everything was flying all over the place and the batters looked far too comfortable. Sensing the carnage, skipper Al Murray stepped in with a simple but effective fix: "go up the hill." It turned out to be inspired captaincy. From the very first ball at the new end, my pace felt controlled, the rhythm returned, and suddenly I was in the game.

The wickets began to come steadily, each one chipping away at their top order. By the time I was into my stride, the batters were struggling to settle. In the middle of all this I manage to take a hat trick. The first two were clean bowled and an LBW. For my hat trick ball a lefty came to the crease so I changed to round the wicket and manage to hit the off stump. My first hat trick for Carlton!

There's no better feeling as a bowler than seeing the plan come together like that.

I finished with figures of 5 for 21, which I'll happily take any day of week! But more than anything, it showed the value of teamwork – sharp catching, fielding pressure, tight bowling at the other end, and a captain who knew exactly when (and where) to move me.





### **Carlton On Film and In Print**

Readers might remember from The Arrow Issue 65 a report about footage taken at a Carlton match at Grange Loan in 1922. That footage is now digitised and available on the National Library of Scotland's Moving Image Archive. This link will take you to it. A most enjoyable 90 seconds of a world long gone.





Meanwhile Carlton also features in a recent publication, the second volume of stories about top players playing in club cricket.

It recounts how the great Pakistani leg spinner Abdul Qadir played for Stenhousemuir in 1985 against Carlton at Grange Loan. As was told in The Arrow 77, he returned the not so stellar bowling figures of 1-110, as Carlton's skipper Steve Alleyne hit him to all parts of the ground. However Qadir had the last laugh as he returned the compliment and blasted 98\* to secure victory for Stenhousemuir.

It was a chill wind which shook the cherry blossom on GL's trees as the 2025 season opened with Carlton 2nd XI restored to the Championship. They welcomed Heriot's 2, who took advantage of the staggered start to the EPL to give match time to a number of Predictably they proved too first teamers. strong for Carlton, whose batting effort was not helped when Oli Stones dislocated a finger while fielding. Elsewhere the 4s opened with a solid victory at Roseburn - although Vijay Raghavan's attempt to notch the winning runs with a big hit into the rugby stadium was foiled by one of those spectacular one-handed running catches at long off.

It was the 5th XI the following day who provided the best excitement of the opening weekend when their Div 7 opener against Edinburgh 3 at GL went down to the wire. With young Josh Cully hitting an imperious 50, the balance of advantage tilted one way then the other as the closing overs approached. At the death, a single off the last ball left the scores tied, honours even and handshakes all round.

With the weather beginning to warm up, a start of season visit of Pizza Geeks was popular. The First XI got into action with a solid win against Falkland. Highlights were the innings of 87 from new arrival Angus Guy (see elsewhere in this issue for Angus' take on his first season at Carlton). He seems to like GL - on his previous appearance for Clydesdale in the Championship Final in 2016 he scored 53. The following week saw Carlton's other winter recruit Ollie Davidson return the only century of the league campaign at Barnton, although disappointingly the home side overtook Carlton's total of 284 with apparent ease.


The Women's First XI also got into action with a victory, although the game was disrupted by a serious injury to an opposition player and an ambulance taking up position at square leg.



An apparently solid victory for the Second XI over Edin Accies on the basis of a top class innings of 75 by Ben Stronach proved illusory as Carlton were stripped of the points for playing a player not properly registered.



A half century for the skipper and a 5-fer for Scott Fraser were not enough for the 5s against Holy Cross as they fell 7 runs short in a season of close finishes.



The Scottish Cup campaign got underway with a good away win against Stenhousemuir which brought Rudy Adair his first 5-wicket haul for the 1s. Next opposition would be Drumpellier at GL.

The Masterton also got underway with a good home win over Grange (always a pleasure). Dan Da Costa notched 109 off 64 balls, his only ton of the season. Wins followed over Drummond Trinity and Watsonians, when a 173 run partnership between Dan Da Costa (80\*) and Angus Guy (70\*) brought victory in some style, but an unexpected loss to StewMel meant that Carlton would face Heriot's in the Finals Day in July.

On 17 May a last wicket partnership of 60 between Charles Stronach and Conor Regan just failed to bring victory for the 2s at Gala. The 3s squeaked past Clackmannan by 4 runs to notch their first win, the narrowest of the season. A half century by Charlie Kentish well supported by Andrew Lang and John Gill provided enough for the bowlers to work with and bring a smile to skipper Brad's face.

On the Sunday, in victory at East Kilbride, Charis Scott took her second 5 wicket haul for Carlton - 5 for 25 from her 6 overs. The final game of the weekend saw a Mixed Development side containing 4 family pairs, including 2 father and daughter combinations, take on RHC at Peffermill.



On 24 May, Carlton welcomed Chris McBride back to the ranks in a solid victory over StewMel and it was his 79\* which ensured Scottish Cup victory over Drumpellier the following day.

The 2s could not get the better of Grange 2s despite a 99 run partnership between Harry Simpson and Ben D'Ulisse. For the 3s at Bass Rock youngsters Hamish Foley (64) and Tom Hathorn (39) showed the potential that would gain them Scotland u15 selections later in the season. The Women's match at Inverleith was abandoned with the rain calculator awarding the match to StewMel - a blow to the hopes of retaining the title.



The final day of May saw the 2s visit Linlithgow and bowl the home side out for 67 with Charles and Conor both taking 5 wickets. The first time that there has been a Carlton double 5-fer since Cheeky and Omar did it at Myreside in May 2021.



### June, she'll change her tune In restless walks she'll prowl the night\*

As the weather became a bit more unsettled in an otherwise hot and dry summer, a number of cancellations and abandoned matches dented the momentum of the season. The Women's league campaign suffered another reverse when a very youthful side fell to defeat to eventual champions Watsonians/Dumfries. Meanwhile, a belligerent 71 from Benji Risi put the 5s in a winning position against MDAFS as they climbed to their highest position in the league and the skipper began to ponder whether promotion would be a good thing.

On Sunday 8 June Carlton's pride in the history-making first ever u16 Girls Cup match was tempered with the disappointment of coming second to Stew Mel despite a bright innings of 37 from Amy Yang. Later that day the Women took on Grange with Abbi Aitken-Drummond dominating the match with 113\*, her 3rd century for Carlton which also saw her become the first Carlton woman to 1000 runs.



Rain developed an unhelpful habit of falling at 3pm on Saturday causing a number of matches to be abandoned in successive weeks in June.

The weather also had other impacts. On 15 June the 5s returned their first ever 10 wicket win - as youngsters Hamish Foley and Josh Cully easily overtook DT's more than modest total of 46 after a convincing bowling performance on a questionable surface at Inverleith.

# Season 2025 - A Summary

The First XI became unstuck against Edinburgh South on a damp Inch pitch - a sub-par batting performance seemed to have been rescued by the bowlers but what looked like a winning position disappeared in a flurry of big-hitting by South's No 10 bat.

The Firsts put that low behind them and followed up the next day with an overwhelming cup win against Arbroath. Conor Regan had the ball on a string from the first over and finished with 7-17 leaving Arbroath far behind Carlton's total of 195. A performance which deservedly saw him June's Littlejohn's POM.



On the last Saturday of June the First XI entered the Peak Nails Period which would see 3 matches against the old rivals in ten days. The EPL encounter at GL went the visitors' way, as Heriot's took full advantage of the depleted bowling resources after Rudy Adair dislocated a finger in the 6th over, amassing 312 for 4, a total the home side fell well short of.

Meanwhile the 2s convincingly won at Goldenacre in what was easily their best performance of the season. Tight bowling, with wickets shared around the bowlers, restricted Heriot's to 114 and an untroubled 72\* from Pavan Yaradi saw Carlton smoothly home.

The Home of Cricket (aka the Meadows) lived up to its reputation when the 5s met Edinburgh CC there as the second half of the ESCA season got underway.

No nail biting last ball tie this time. They bowled Edinburgh out for an apparently modest 103 but could only muster 23 in reply - the lowest total in 5s history. Their previous lowest had been 41ao in 2016, also against Edinburgh 3.

By contrast, the following Sunday brought lots to cheer with a first 5 wicket haul for Keira Ansell in victory over Lomond Lynx and 87\* for Hamish Foley in a high scoring victory for the 4s at GL against MDAFs. Both would go on to represent Scotland in age group games later in the season.

The weather now settled into a prolonged hot and dry spell, scorching GL's outfield and making things tough for fielders. The first weekend in July saw good victories for the Firsts at Falkland, which featured a <u>maiden First XI half century for Ben Stronach</u>.



The 3s began to make a habit of last over wins - the first of three in the second half of the season came over DT2, featuring an excellent innings of 81 by Tom Hathorn which brought Tom the July Littlejohn's POM.

Aaradhy Khadse's 5-1 at Kirkhill set up a 9 wicket win for the 4s.


It was back to Peak Nails on the Sunday for the Scottish Cup Semi-Final when rain interruptions made it difficult for Carlton to chase Heriot's total they returned and their lowest 50 over score of the summer. meaning that the Goldenacre men proceeded to the Scottish Cup Final.



On 12 July good batting by James Stronach and debuting Fergus Foley supported Dan DaCosta and Carlton beat RHC at GL. Dan fell four runs short of a ton - his highest score of the league campaign. The following day Hamish Turner's 5 wickets for the 4s included a hat trick, but it was not enough to deny Gala a win. Elsewhere in this issue Hamish describes his hat trick.

Masterton Finals Day on Sunday 20 July brought the 1s an early start at Goldenacre, taking on Heriot's again. Opting to bat first the Arrows produced a performance well below par posting a total of 97 for 9 from their 20 overs. Olly Davidson top scored with 30 but only 3 other batters made it to double figures. Although they did produce a decent bowling performance a few uncharacteristic lapses in the field let Heriot's off the hook. In the end the home side got over the line with 8 wickets and 21 balls to spare and went on to beat RHC in the final. This is Heriot's 9th winning of the trophy - Carlton have won it 16 times.

The Women were also in T20 Cup action at Inverleith, taking on StewMel in the first round of the Beyond Boundaries Women's Scottish T20 Cup. A brave batting effort led by top scoring Maisie Maceira, more oten the match winner with the ball, just failed to overtake the SteMel total on the last ball.





against StewMel with a number of the Carlton Legends watching. The innovative Carlton Olympics organised by the First XI followed in the evening - a highly competitive set of challenges. It was a pity that the attendance was dampened by the weather.



5-15 for John Gill in the 4s match against league leaders TPV was not enough to bring victory. The next day saw the 3s gain a much needed win with 4 balls to spare against Bass Rock at GL, with Euan Keatinge top scoring with 68 and good runs from Aadi Khadse and Tom Hathorn.



August, die she must The autumn winds blow chilly and cold\*

Suddenly it was August and the run in for the leagues. The First XI needed Heriot's to lose to give them the opportunity to beat them in the final match and so claim the title. The 2s desperately needed to squeeze out a couple of victories to move nearer safety. There was congestion at the bottom of Division 2 where the 3s also needed wins to be safe. Wins for the 4s in the first two weeks of the month secured their position and the 5th XI were also in a relatively comfortable position.

As August unfolded the 2s continued to struggle - while they won against bottom of the table Linlithgow, they failed to notch another victory despite the welcome return of Kyle Macpherson and Pete Gill. The reverse against co-relegation candidates Morton at Loretto was particularly disappointing - Carlton scored more runs off the bat but the large number of extras conceded proved the difference between the teams. The 2s ended up 9th, but were saved from relegation by the promotion of Watsonians to the EPL meaning only one club would be relegated.



While an excellent win for the 3s against MDAFS, featuring an opening partnership of 123 by Eaun Keatinge and Shaun Smith - the third highest opening partnership in 3s history (the highest being the undefeated 166 by Seb Rae and Kyle Macpherson in 2011 against Penicuik 2), helped the cause greatly. But reverses against Edin Accies 2 and Edinburgh 2 meant the 3s entered the final match of the season against fellow strugglers

Kirk Brae needing 7 points from the match to be safe.

Set 197 to win, things didn't get off to a good start as they were soon 21 for 2. But good batting by Hamish Foley, Tom Hathorn and Anish Amin kept the innings on track. Nevertheless when Max D'Ulisse joined Anish at 85-6 there was still some way to go to secure the necessary batting points.

Slowly they got the score moving and passed the critical 110. Job done!

The run rate was still demanding but supporters began to think that a win could be pulled off. As Anish passed his 50 (his 3rd half century in three innings in August for which he received the August Littlejohn POM award) this began to look more likely. But shortly after he was dismissed in the 38th over with 16 runs still wanted. Dougie Firth joined Max. At the start of the final over 10 runs were needed. 2, 1, 1, 2 meant that 4 were needed off the final two balls.

Who needs two when one will do? Dougie blasted a mighty 4 off ball 5 and Dougie and Max returned to the excited accolades of parents and team-mates. Peak Carlton and a great finale to the season at Grange Loan!



maintained The **Firsts** their winning August throughout unfortunately so did Heriots (who saved their poor performances for the Cup Championship Finals) so the final match of the Premiership Season was reached with Heriot's already having retained the title. Ever one to make a point, Shiv Jhala took 6 wickets in the final match to leave Heriot's all out for a total which Carlton might have overtaking had fancied rain not put an end to proceedings.





Later that evening even the President's speech couldn't dampen the enjoyment of the End of Season Dinner, splendidly catered by Square Cut Kitchen.



And then all that was left was for Carlton legend Fraser Watts to bring his star studded MCC team for the end of season friendly. Fans who turned up were disappointed not to see the legend at the crease, but were entertained by 96 for Carlton's Chris McBride in the MCC cause. An excellent partnership of 89 between Isaac Foley and Pete Gill for the second wicket and a blistering half century by Dan Da Costa was not enough to bring victory to the hosts.

# PITCHERO SUPREMO MARTIN FIRTH DONS HIS WET TOWEL AND REVIEWS THE VOLUMINOUS DATA FOR POINTS OF INTEREST

Here we go, the 2025 trawl through the guagmire that is Pitchero's database of playing stats.

#### First, two disclaimers:

- Any data analysis is only as good as the quality of the underlying data, and some of the data in Pitchero is decidedly dodgy. I've fixed anything I've spotted, but there are bound to be errors remaining.
- Any data analysis is only as good as the quality of the person doing the analysis, so the following should be treated as for entertainment only.

#### **Fixtures**

Carlton played 314 fixtures in 2025, and a further 32 were cancelled. The cancellations were primarily triggered by a wet week in June, a slightly damp end to the season and a lack of availability for junior games during the summer holidays.

We played 179 senior fixtures, and 135 junior ones (Table1). The vast majority (219) were league fixtures, 22 were cup games and 73 were friendlies, although a number of the 5s friendlies were tightly competed series with neighbours for recently established shiny trophies. Even with the highly active women's section we enjoy at Carlton, male teams play more cricket with an average of 28 matches for men's teams and 19.5 for females. A number of women and girls have turned out for men and boys teams.

Table 2 shows the number of matches played by each senior team. Unsurprisingly, of the senior teams, the 5s played the most games (42), with a heavy programme of mid-week games complementing the league programme. The 1s lie some way behind with 28 matches, and the Women's second team are in 3rd place with 22, including a good number of friendlies.

Table 3 shows the number of players used by each team. In total 149 players played at least one match for a senior side. Many of course played for more than one team through the season.

The Women's first team was the most frugal in terms of players, fielding just 23 all season. Predictably, the 5s used the most - 68 players among whom were a significant number of junior players taking their first steps in senior cricket - 11 such were introduced to league cricket for the first time this season one of the highest rates in the 5s existence. On the other hand the 3rd XI deployed 47 players, including 11 different wicket-keepers, which is probably not ideal from a playing standpoint. The same XI did not take the field at any time.

Carlton takes considerable pride in how our Junior section provides a steady stream of talented players into our senior teams. As shown in Table 4, our league teams include on average 3 current juniors every weekend - so out of 77 players representing Carlton in senior leagues on any weekend, 33 will be juniors. The highest average is the Women's 2s with 4.5 juniors. The 5s are 2nd with 4.3 juniors, followed by the 3s with 4.2. Unsurprisingly, the 1s and 2s have the lowest average, 0.9 and 1.1 juniors respectively.

The highest average weekend for juniors was 14/15 June with 3.8 per team. But that's a bit misleading, as the 1s, 2s, 3s & 4s were all cancelled by rain. The highest actual number of juniors was 25, on 12/13 July, which was also the highest average on a weekend when (almost) all our senior teams played of 3.6.

### **Appearances**

279 players represented Carlton in at least one fixture this season. 149 players played in senior fixtures, 173 in junior ones and 43 played in both senior and junior.

144 players (over 50%) played fewer than 10 fixtures (including 31 players who played just once). 4 players played more than 40. The most fixtures played by a single player was 57.

So who were these eager beavers who just can't get enough cricket?

As usual, the top 10 is dominated by juniors. Aaradhy Khadse leads the way with a mammoth 57 games - more than 3 a week! Tom Sweet follows closely behind with 50 matches and Arjun Shelke is 3rd on 43. (It is worth noting that each of these players had a 5 wicket haul in senior matches this season - so practice does make perfect!).

In 4th place is the only senior player in the top 10: Carlton's very own Ms Cricket Sarah Beith played 40 fixtures this summer, topping her 35 appearances last year.

For seniors alone no one can get near Sarah: Holly Sladen and Amelia Beattie clocked up 29 and 28 appearances respectively while skipper Dan Da Costa was ever present in the First XIs 28 matches. A mid-season injury and foreign excursion limited Keith Murray's appearances to 27, well below his strike rate in recent years.

Of course, friendly games are great, but the business of the cricket season is the senior league and cup games. Looking just at those: Dan and Sarah top the list with 26 - not bad for an 18 week season - followed by Arun on 23 and Aggie, Angus & James S on 22.

9 other players somehow managed to play 18 league and cup games: Rory A, Ruari, Holly, Olly, Amelia, Sam, Keira, Rory L & Ajitha. 8 of the top 20 are women, which is a good reflection of how mainstream women's cricket has become at Carlton. 3 of those (Aggie, Keira & Sonia) are juniors, which I think shows how strong our pipeline of players is.



It's not only players who have put in a shift - eclipsing them all is Kelly Foley who scored nigh on 30 matches through the season. Where there was a Foley on the team sheet, there was a good chance you'd find her on the book. Bravissima!



### More Pitchero - The Pipeline - Former Juniors in Senior Cricket

On average, senior teams this year included 3 graduates from the junior section in addition to the 3 current juniors. But the spread is very different.

- Women's teams have very few ex-juniors below 1 per team, simply because girls cricket is still new and hasn't delivered very many 16+ year old players yet.
- The 4s and 5s have very few ex-juniors 2 and 1 respectively. That makes sense too they have the most current juniors, also the most older players who are playing lower league cricket for fun (for some definition of fun).
- The 2s have an average of 7.6 ex-juniors a week. OK, so one is Charles, but even 6.6 is a large number. And the 1s are second highest with 3.9, just ahead of the 3s with 3.6. The First XI fielded 9 ex- juniors, as well as 2 current juniors, at some point this season.

My interpretation of this is that the junior system is working well, producing players for our upper teams.

# Fond Memories of Summers at Grange Loan Cameron Shoebridge

A welcome visitor to Grange Loan for this year's end of season match with MCC was Cameron Shoebridge, whose seasons at Grange Loan he recalls with affection.

Being back at Grange Loan on the final Sunday in August to play for the MCC in its annual fixture against Carlton CC brought back many fond memories of the 3 summers that I spent playing for The Arrows in 2015, 2016 and 2017. It was great to catch up with players and supporters who I remembered from my time at the club and also some of the newer Carlton players who have contributed to another successful season in 2025.

There are a lot of stand-out moments for me from my seasons at Carlton CC but inevitably the highlight was my final match for the club being in the team when we won the Scottish Cup for the first time in the club's history in an epic match against a very strong Watsonians side up at Broughty Ferry. Carlton were behind the 8 ball for large parts of the match but some valuable late order runs from Ali Evans and Cheeky Gosain got us up to a defendable total and then the bowlers got us over the line.



It was a real privilege to be part of such a significant moment in the club's history and to play with a great group of lads that including experienced internationals like Fraggle, Ali and Rory McCann as well as the youngsters like Cheeky, Angus Beattie and Ruari Macpherson who had come up through the club's youth teams.

I also have a very clear memory of my first ever match for the Club which was playing for Rob Thornton's 2nd XI against Glenrothes 1st XI at Gilvenbank Park. Finding their ground was a challenge but it was a great game and gave me an early sighter as to the standard of cricket in the East of Scotland. My first wicket that day and so my first ever scalp in Scotlish Cricket was bowling Chris Greaves - an achievement that has grown in stature in the years since 2015 thanks to his career progression.

It was a great time to be playing at Carlton CC as the club enjoyed some outstanding on-field successes during those few years, apart from winning the Scottish Cup the club won the Eastern Premier League in 2016 (if I remember winning the League was confirmed on the outfield at Mannofield without a ball being bowled due to the weather) and there were some good performances in the Masterson Cup. There is still no finer sight in cricket than watching Hugo Southwell in full flight during a 20/20 innings (unless you're bowling to him!).

On a personal level, I learnt so much during my summers at Grange Loan, not just as a cricketer but as a person as well. During my time with the club I got to play a lot of 1st and 2nd team cricket, was lucky enough to get selected for Scotland U19's and Scotland A, the Eastern Knights and also had some weeks playing with Durham CCC.

I was only 16 when I first arrived so I was fairly wet behind the ears to say the least, but I got some great coaching and guidance from people like Stevie Gilmour and Toby Bailey and some of the club's overseas players like Ryan McCloy and Mike Herdman gave me some good advice and encouragement. Actually it was Ryan who saved me from a potentially disastrous moment, I was helping him with some groundskeeping and I persuaded him to let me have a go on the ride on roller, big mistake, going down the hill the roller built up a rapid head of steam and like a scene from Speed 2 was heading straight for the stone wall and then probably out onto Grange Loan itself! Like the resourceful Queenslander that he is, Ryan somehow got himself into the driver's seat to slam on the brakes. Quite understandably Moon gave me a lifetime ban from the roller after that.

I will always have very fond memories of my Summers in Edinburgh, there is literally no better place to be on those long Summer days. Everyone at the club did so much to help me settle and made me feel very welcome, not just the players and coaches but people like Hugh Parker, Andy Macpherson and Ann who had to put up with me as a lodger for a couple of seasons.

It was great to be back at Grange Loan last month and to see the club in such great shape and hopefully I'll be back for the MCC fixture in 2026.
